PULPWOOD FOR 900 YEARS. The last period, from 1894 to 1902, has been a period of development. The first pulp concession was made in 1894 to Mr. Clergue, and the half dozen men employed by him at that time had now

grown to 6,000. The opposition said the government was wasting the pulp forests. There were 288,000,000 cord of pulpwood in Northern Ontario. He asked how many years it would take for these seven pulp mills to consume the pulpwood supply of the Province of Ontario. Just 900 years.

Mr. Ross went on to point out that in Ontario the pulpwood and the pine had to be manufactured within the province, contrasting this with Quebec, where pulpwood might be exported without let or hindrance. He spoke again of the government railway to Temiskaming, in order to state that the road would be built with steel rails made from Canadian ore in the rolling mills which the government had subsidized at Sault Ste. Marie. Was that, he asked, a good thing for Ontario? To go a little further, was it a good thing for Canada?

THE OPPOSITION RECORD. He pointed out that if the opposition had had its way during the past 30 years there would have been no distri-bution of the surplus, no vote by ballot, no School of Practical Science, no separation of the liquor traffic from municipal control, no minister of education, no Normal School at London or Ottawa, no colonization roads in many new districts, no surveys of crown lands, no New Ontario, no new parliament buildings, no improvements In the separate school acts, no asylum at Brockville, no superintendent of neglected and dependent children, no superintendent of forestry, no Normal College, no county council reform, no Western Dairy School, no provincial municipal auditor, nd revenue from taxes on corporations, no pioneer dairy farm, ro sub-stantial development of the pulp industry, no railway subsidies for col-

onization purposes.
"You can see if all these things were eliminated from the scientific agencies for the improvement of the province how little would be left, and how weak the efforts of the government would be to maintain the standard of the prov-ince. We are entering this election with confidence. We have nothing to withdraw in the shape of legislation that has been found useless or ineffective. We have no apology to offer for any measure that we have submitted to the people."

THE PROHIBITION ISSUE. Speaking of prohibition he said: "I, for one, if called upon, shall not shrink from such discussion. If, on the other hand, it is thought best to decide the pending election on those great questions of public policy which so closely affect the material prosperity of the province outside the question of prohibition, so be it. Then after the din of party strife has subsided and the public mind is free to be directed to the issues involved in prohibition, let every man turn his attention thoughtfully and seriously to the responsibility of easting his ballot on Dec. 4. as he may be directed by his judgment and his conscience in such a weighty matter, for as Whittier puts it, "The king-liest act of freedom is the freeman's

#### Failures In Canada.

[Dun's Review, April 5.] Insolvencies in the Dominion of Canada numbered 363, against 424 in 1901, while liabilities were \$3,439,992, compared with \$3,333,722 last year. In number there was little change in British Columbia, but the losses were heavier. Only small changes were recorded in the other provinces. An electric headlight which throws a vertical as well as a horizontal beam of light is being tried on the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railway. A 518,700 of light is being tried on the Chicago, 119,000 Milwaukee and St. Paul Railway. A steam turbine has its shaft connected directly to that of a dynamo, furnishing a current for the arc lamps in the headlight.
