

HIRES ASSASSINS TO SLAY MOTHER

Daughter Asks Detectives to Beat
Old Woman "Until She
Died."

Chicago, Nov. 14.—Plotting matricide in the most cold-blooded manner, in order to obtain \$7,000, May L. Otis, 36 years old, carried her plans to the point where she believed four days would see their fulfillment, then was arrested by the men she believed her fellow conspirators.

She was to point her mother out to the man she had hired to commit the crime, that he might make no mistake. She had paid over \$100 cash and signed a note for \$2,400 to procure the commission of the crime. She had outlined in detail how her mother was to be done to death and had warned the assassin as she for the crime and the money which was to result from it, she exhibited the most intense satisfaction at what she believed the certain fulfillment of her plot.

Shows Greed in Talks.

In all her conversations her greed was uppermost, and before entering up the details of her plan she made sure of the exact amount which she might hope to derive through her mother's death.

Mrs. Sarah Otis, the mother and intended victim of the unnatural daughter, is 57 years old. Her home in Chicago is with a sister, a Mrs. Smith. She lives in the rear of 328 Walnut street. All her life she has worked as a domestic and by economy has accumulated something over \$5,000 and kept up a life insurance policy for \$1,500. Her daughter, too, always has done menial work. Her home is at 640 Forty-sixth place, and until recently she had worked for the Kline Optical Company, 52 State street.

Plots While on Visit.

In September, this woman went to Maunton, Wis., to visit her father. The daughter joined her there Oct. 22 and remained until Oct. 30. Apparently, from the developments, she was plotting then against her mother, but in no way betrayed her feelings toward Mrs. Otis.

One week ago, soon after her return to Chicago, she visited the Keystone Detective Agency, 234 LaSalle street. She had determined on her plan of action. First she wished to make sure the amount for which she was plotting. The superintendent of the detective agency is Robert C. Stolsman. She insisted on seeing him personally, and told him that she wished merely to ascertain how much her mother's estate amounted to.

Mr. Stolsman agreed to furnish her a schedule of the property, unaware of the woman's purpose. He ascertained that Mrs. Otis was possessed of mortgages amounting to \$4,800, the life insurance policy of \$1,500 and \$1,000 cash in the Illinois Trust and Savings Bank.

The daughter's eyes lighted with greed as she perused the paper on which Mr. Stolsman had scheduled the estate.

"And to think all that should be mine," she muttered. Suddenly she turned to Mr. Stolsman and demanded:

"How far would you go for money?"

Staggered by the question, the head of the detective agency hesitated, then hoping to learn the woman's purpose, said:

"Well, I don't know. I'd go a long way for money."

"And so would I," Miss Otis declared to have the money. I would get all she has. We can arrange it very easily. She is pretty old, and it would not be hard to get away with her."

Mr. Stolsman pretended to be impressed and willing to undertake the crime.

"But I'll have to think it over," he said at last. "You come back tomorrow."

Tells Detective Chief.

When Miss Otis had departed Mr. Stolsman went to Captain O'Brien of the detective bureau to seek advice. The story was unfolded to Captain O'Brien, who at first refused to credit it. Finally convinced that the private detective was not dreaming, he instructed him to make an engagement with Miss Otis to complete the details of plans for the murder.

The interview between Captain O'Brien and Mr. Stolsman was on last Monday. Tuesday Miss Otis again called at the detective agency and insisted on knowing how much Mr. Stolsman would demand for carrying out the plot, and agreed that the following afternoon she was to pay him \$100 cash and sign the note for \$2,400.

Mr. Stolsman in return was to have a man ready who would undertake the actual crime.

"Murderer" Is Detailed.

The "murderer" selected was Detective Dennis Mackey of headquarters. All the financial details having been arranged, Miss Otis was instructed by Stolsman to return at 6 o'clock last evening to meet the murderer.

Assigned to the case with Mackey was Detective Peter Fitzgerald. He waited at the street door, while Mac-

key went to the office of the detective agency to meet Miss Otis.

There she explained to him that she would lure her mother to Chicago within four days and would accompany Mackey to the railroad station at which she would arrive and point her out to him. Then he was to follow her until they reached some dark street, where he was to murder her in any manner that seemed best to him.

"But I want a good job done," Miss Otis warned.

Then, Miss Otis, highly pleased at what she believed the approaching fruition of her plan, left the office. As she stepped from the elevator she was arrested by Detective Fitzgerald. Confronted at the Harrison street police station by Detective Mackey and Mr. Stolsman, she admitted that she had plotted for her mother's murder and expressed chagrin that she had failed.

WILHELM MADE MATTERS WORSE

The Nation Indignant at His Indifference to the Crisis.

Berlin, Nov. 14.—The Kaiser, who is still with Prince Furstenberg's hunting party at Donaueschingen, will leave tomorrow for Kiel, where he will preside on Monday at the swearing in of naval recruits. He will also hold a conference with Chancellor Buelow, which it is expected will settle the question of the latter's retention of the chancellorship.

Chancellor von Buelow carries with him to this momentous interview the support of the Bundesrath and a great majority of the Reichstag, to say nothing of the bulk of public opinion. The Emperor's absence from Berlin and occupying himself in hunting or other amusements in a remote part of the empire while Parliament and the people are in a ferment of excitement, has produced the worst impression and is sharply criticised by newspapers of all sections.

The Conservative party, which is composed of ultra-loyalists, tried to divert the abuse to the chancellor by issuing an official communication upbraiding him for not shielding the Kaiser in the Reichstag, and for not summoning him to the capital in the course of the last momentous day, but the Conservative press, although it generally supports the emperor, does not condemn the Kaiser's apparent indifference in a grave national crisis. The nation now impatiently awaits the outcome of the Kiel meeting, which is expected to end in the resignation of the chancellor, followed by that of the Prussian cabinet.

FROM NEWSBOY TO MILLIONAIRE

Jake Berger, of Winnipeg, Made Rich Strike in Alaska.

Winnipeg, Nov. 14.—There is always a romantic interest attached to the man who drifts back to civilization from a country where the gold lure is the paramount attraction in men's lives and when the miner in question has returned successful and opulent to his native city, where as a boy he was a street vendor of newspapers, this interest is surely enhanced an hundredfold.

Such a man is Jake Berger, late of Nome, Alaska, who arrived in Winnipeg yesterday and who is occupying apartments in the Royal Alexandra hotel, a man who has forced his way to the top in the struggle for supremacy at the gold fields. Surrounded by all the elegance that wealth can afford, Berger, nevertheless, reflects in his features something of the rugged life he has lived and shows all the broad-minded and large-hearted traits of the man who has lived long in the open.

In 1898, when the gold fever had reached its height, Berger left Winnipeg on his own account. He was 26 years of age at the time, and confident of his ability to succeed, struck out for the Klondike, going in by way of Chilkoot Pass. From the first it was a case of dogged persistence, and at times it was a grim struggle. Then came the news of a rich strike at Nome, and the young Winnipegger in 1899 joined the rush and found fortune. At first, with thousands of others, he worked with a rocker on the beach at Nome, and later with his partner, J. T. Sullivan, cleared up a million dollars by operating on Daniel's Creek. Afterwards they bought out a company, which is now capitalized at \$500,000, and this, with other properties, is operated with the most improved machinery.

MADAME ST. ANDRE ACQUITTED.

Montreal, Que., Nov. 14.—After being locked up all night the jury in the case of Madame St. Andre, accused of attempting to shoot Leon Duchesne, a saloonkeeper, returned a verdict of not guilty. The case has occupied the court of king's bench for several days. Once friends, the two had quarrelled, and Madame St. Andre, it was alleged, drove to Duchesne's place in a cab and fired a revolver shot through the saloon window. Madame St. Andre was formerly an actress.

WOULDN'T ACCEPT LEGACY.

Toronto, Nov. 14.—Because William Hill, of Guelph, refused to accept a legacy of \$1,000, his mother applied today at Osgoode Hall to have him declared a lunatic. Mr. Justice Riddell, to whom application was made, did not yield to what must have been a natural inclination to grant a request supported by such convincing evidence, but reserved judgment.

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VICTORY SCORED BY LAMPHERE

Coroner's Verdict Ruled Out as
Evidence of Death of
Mrs. Guinness.

Laporte, Ind., Nov. 14.—Today was decidedly Lamphere's day in the Laporte circuit court room, where the farm hand of Belle Guinness is on trial for murder of his mistress and her three children.

At 5 o'clock, four witnesses, Drs. Mack, Wilcox and Long and Sheriff Smutner had been examined and the testimony of a fourth was of a nature that proved the death of Mrs. Guinness through positive identification of the adult body found in the ruins.

It is the general opinion that the state has thus far failed to establish its contention as to Belle Guinness' death. The rings said to have been found on the hands of the adult body are being played as strong evidence that the body was that of the Guinness woman, but the defense will contend that Belle Guinness placed the hands of a cadaver.

A signal victory was scored by the defense in Judge Richter's instructions to the jury that the coroner's verdict must not be considered as evidence of Belle Guinness' death.

Lamphere Brightens Up.

Ray Lamphere entered the court room this morning a changed man. He was not the same Lamphere of the jury examination, listless and apparently unconcerned. The color of his face resembled a fresh tomato and his eyes shone out from sunken sockets like two pieces of burning charcoal would blaze from a sheet of snow.

The prisoner paled at the opening of the prosecutor's case, and it is believed that court adjourned just in the nick of time to prevent a collapse. That the exhortation of the prosecutor greatly affected the prisoner is undeniable.

Judge Richter announced that in fairness to the jury court would be held on Saturday during the trial.

Coroner First Witness.

Coroner Mack was the first witness on the stand today. He was quite uncertain about his answers at times. He testified to the finding of the bodies in the charred ruins of the Guinness home and said one was that of an adult female, the other three of children.

The testimony of Dr. J. L. Gray, who conducted the autopsy on the body of the adult female, found in the upper vertebrae down to the fifth, were also gone. The left arm was burned to the upper third. The right arm was disconnected at the shoulder. The right leg was burned off at the knee. The left leg was

THREATEN A SCANDAL

Archduke Leopold of Austria Stirs Up Some Old Stories.

Berne, Switzerland, Nov. 14.—Leopold Woelfling, formerly Archduke Leopold of Austria, is prosecuting a journalist here for defamation of character. The journalist in retaliation threatens sensational revelations by promising to read letters from the Emperor of Austria to the Grand Duke of Tuscany.

Archduke Leopold of Austria, the son of the Grand Duke of Tuscany, was cast off several years ago by his father when he became enamored of Mme. Almonici, a Bavarian actress, and married her. Emperor Francis Joseph ordered his name stricken from the army list, and from the role of the Court Knights of the Golden Fleece. He then assumed the name of Woelfling. Divorcing his actress wife in July, 1907, because she joined a sect of vegetarians, and was in the habit of taking sun baths without her clothes, Woelfling married Frau Ritter, daughter of a horse owner. Woelfling is a brother of ex-Crown Princess Louise, of Saxony, whose escapades as the Countess Montinosa made her notorious.

Frank Lettich, of Ridgeway, a former brakeman on the Port Macquarie, is suing the railway for \$5,000 for the loss of a foot. He was knocked off a train in the St. Thomas yards last summer by a switchboard, losing his foot.

WOMAN BLOWS UP CAB WITH BOMB

Takes Short Ride in Vehicle and Leaves Infernal Machine in It.

New York, Nov. 14.—The explosion of what is supposed to have been a dynamite bomb in a taxicab in front of the Grand Central station on Forty-second street, created excitement in the vicinity about midnight. The cab was wrecked, but so far as known no one was hurt. According to the police the machine was hired by a woman in front of a Broadway restaurant and she is supposed to have placed the bomb.

Diamond Phanaus was the chauffeur in charge of the taxicab. He said he was waiting in front of a Broadway restaurant when a young woman dressed in black appeared and the Grand Central station. Upon arriving at the depot the woman stepped from the taxicab and hurried into the depot.

Phanaus said he looked into the cab and saw what appeared to be a tin box on the floor, and just entered the woman and had just entered the door of the station when he heard an explosion, followed closely by another, but slighter shock.

Forgetting the woman, Phanaus turned to the door again. He found his taxicab had been blown to fragments.

TORTURED BY THIEVES

Contractor Strapped to Tree in Woods and Left to Perish.

Huntington, N. Y., Nov. 13.—Charles Thomas cut his throat and fell to the floor in a dying condition as detectives today burst open the door of the house in which he was hiding. Thomas was removed to the Nassau County Hospital, where it was said he would die. According to the police the man made a statement, in which he said he was one of the men who a few days ago held up and robbed Antonio Borla, a contractor of Amittville, N. Y. Borla was tied to a tree in a dense woods and his clothing cut off with razors. His flesh was gashed a number of times. A sum of money was taken from Borla, and the man was left to die from exposure. Borla was told that if he escaped and told anyone of the theft, the robbers would return and kill him. All night the
