

A Glance at Life in Great Britain--Happenings in England, Ireland and Scotland Briefly Chronicled

5,000,000 STAMPS

Used by a Man in Papering His Room.

Mr. Richard Sharpe, of the Jubilee Stamp House, North Bersted, Bognor, has an entire room papered with stamps, collected during the last 45 years, and festoons of stamps hang across the room. There are about 5,000,000 stamps, and their face value is more than \$400,000.

The body of Sir Theodore Martin, in accordance with his expressed wish, was interred at Brompton Cemetery, London, where Lady Martin was buried.

Each Dreadnought has a bakery, a barber's shop, a tailor's shop, a boot repairer's, a canteen, and a hospital holding about 60 patients, with two surgeons.

A passenger by the Castle Liner Saxon, named Maxwell Williams, of Skelton, York, jumped overboard on the journey home from the Cape, and was drowned. Williams was under medical treatment on board, but momentarily eluded observation.

A demonstration of the working of a self-discharging collar patented by the Wear shipbuilders, Messrs. Doxford & Sons, was given lately at Sunderland.

The vessel, the steamer Pallion, has been bought by the Dunrobin Shipping Company, Limited, of Newcastle. She is fitted throughout with twin belt conveyors, which will discharge the whole of the cargo at the rate of 250 tons per hour on each side of the vessel, making 500 tons in all.

A barefooted tramp, sentenced at Woking to fourteen days' imprisonment for begging, told the police that going without boots made a difference of 8s to 10s a day to him. At the seaside he sometimes took as much as £1 a day without asking.

A silk weaver's widow, named Emma Buckridge, who lived at Abery Road, Bethnal Green, recently had her house broken into whilst she was out shopping, and lost her jewelry and money. Thereupon the old lady got a retriever dog for protection, but one day she fell over the dog, dislocating her shoulder, and had to be taken to the London Hospital. She was ultimately found dead in her chair.

At Aldershot a verdict of "Suicide while of unsound mind" was returned at the inquest on Walter Farmer, whose body was taken out of the Basingstoke Canal. It was stated he had left a note to the effect that he had "sinned beyond forgiveness" against his darling wife, whom he could not look in the face.

Several children who were playing at Bishop's Park, Fulham, picked some red berries and ate them, and subsequently became ill. Those sent to a hospital showed symptoms of poisoning.

FATAL SALVOES

Firing at Funeral Results in Old Man's Death.

The firing of salves on Tuesday at a military funeral at Llandilo frightened a pair of horses, and the driver's day in a street adjoining the churchyard. They bolted and knocked down an old man named William Jones, 80 years of age, who died of his injuries.

Scottish ironmasters at Glasgow have announced another advance of 1s. per ton for their special brands, consequent upon a strong inquiry from Canada and America for all classes of manufactured steel. Hematite was also advanced 1s. per ton.

The ancient Cornish game of hurling with a silver ball was witnessed by thousands of spectators at Newquay recently. Among this year's hurlers was Mr. E. H. Lamb, M. P. for Rochester, who got into the thick of the fray.

Miss E. M. Inglis, who for 25 years was in the service of the late Empress Frederick of Germany, died at Cricklewood on Monday. She was nicknamed "Inky" by the Kaiser when he was a boy. She had a pension from the Kaiser.

The roof of an old unoccupied house in Ardwick, Manchester, collapsed and part of the wall fell upon some children. Two were partially buried in the debris, and had to be rescued by the city fire brigade.

The public were lately admitted for the first time to a new gallery in the British Museum. In it have been arranged the casts of Greek and Roman sculptures which were collected quarter of a century ago by Mr. W. C. Perry and placed in the South Kensington Museum.

Mr. Arch. Brakspear was found dead in bed at Henley. Mr. Brakspear, who was head of a well-known firm of brewers, was justice of the peace for Oxfordshire, and a member of Oxfordshire county council.

After a successful year's ministry at Christ Church, Westminster, Bridge road, London, the Rev. John McNeill occupied the Rev. Edward Miller's pulpit of Trinity Church, Streatham, for two or three Sundays in August.

The death took place lately at his residence, South Norwood, of Mr. W. Ford Stanley, educationalist and philanthropist. He was founder and principal of the business house of Stanley & Co., Limited, opticians.

HERRING HARVEST

Drifter's One-Night Catch Sold for \$1,645.

The Lowestoft herring drifter, Pride, landed at Grimsby the results of one night's fishing, consisting of 200 crans, or 200,000 herring. On the market, the catch realized \$1,645, which is believed to be the highest price ever obtained for one night's fishing.

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BEES IN BATTLE

Thousands of Busy Insects Victims of a Fight.

British subjects working in France who meet with accidents arising out of their employment are entitled to claim the benefits of compensation secured to French citizens. Such is the purport of article 1 of the new convention between Great Britain and France concerning workmen's compensation.

An apiculturist at Tiverton placed 50 pounds of honey from his hives in a summer house. Four days later he found all the honey gone and thousands of dead bees, desperate fighting having evidently taken place for the booty.

The two steamers of the London County Council Thames fleet, which were purchased by the Serpentine Government, have arrived at Glattons on the Danube, where they are to serve for passenger traffic on the River Save.

The domestic differences of a couple of octogenarians engaged the attention of the Grimsby stipendiary magistrate, who was called upon to settle a dispute between an old man and an old woman.

The sixth annual baby show was held at the Southend Kursaal lately. The building was crowded with an audience of about 5,000 people. There were 200 babies on show, and they were judged by the audience, the "weeding out" being performed by a special selection committee.

While the St. Nicholas Congregational Church, Ipswich, is undergoing renovation, the pastor is conducting services at the Hippodrome on Sunday evenings.

The Eastbourne Gas Company of London declared a dividend of 15s. per cent on the original capital, and the C. shares, which is stated to be a record for any gas company.

A visitor to Bognor was charged at Chichester with attempting suicide on the sea front. The prisoner, whose name is Ernest Seymour Mann, of Medina Avenue, Merston, was seen by W. A. Ellis, a guest at an hotel, to run into the sea. When pulled out, Mann was nearly unconscious. The prisoner gave no explanation of his act except that he was tired of life.

A remarkable story of how a man squandered a fortune of \$300,000 was told at the bankruptcy court recently, during the examination of John Gay Clarke, an India merchant, of Bishopsgate Street Without. He attributed his failure to losses on the stock exchange, speculation, betting, and gambling, extravagance in living, and to pay heavy interest on loans.

While carrying out quarrying operations on the farm of Mr. P. McQuinn, Drummer, near Fintona, recently, some workmen uncovered a vault about a foot and a half below the ground. The vault contained a quantity of human bones. It is thought they must have been there for many hundreds of years, as on being exposed to the air, many of the bones crumbled to dust.

The annual report of the inspector of lunatics shows that the number of asylum patients is increasing steadily each year in Ireland.

While fishing in Sir John Thorold's lake in Syston Park, Lincs., a visitor named Maw hooked and landed an eel measuring 3 feet 9 inches in length and inches in girth. It weighed 5 pounds.

Prebendary Hutchinson, for 44 years vicar of Blurton, near Stoke-on-Trent, entered upon his hundredth year on Wednesday. While at Rothenbury in his younger days he received public recognition for courageous service at the time of a virulent cholera outbreak epidemic.

Mr. Andrew Carnegie has purchased in England, a 45 h. p. cylinder noiseless Napier motor car with a five seated touring body.

Sir Herbert Maxwell has accepted an invitation of the St. Andrew's Society of Manchester, to their annual dinner on Nov. 20th.

Reputed to be the oldest traveling showman, Mr. Andrew Purchase, owner of a menagerie, started in 1825, has died at Brighton at the age of 74 years.

A verdict of "death from heart disease, accelerated by excessive cigarette smoking," was returned at a Batterssea inquest on the body of Herbert Benjamin Simpson, aged thirty, a crane driver, of Latchmere Grove.

A doctor said the man's fingers were stained with nicotine, and the heart was twice the normal size. No doubt he had been a very heavy smoker.

While warming a tea-can in one of the boiling vats at Messrs. Ormerod Brothers' silk spinning mills at Brighouse, Yorkshire, a youth named Alfred Archer fell into the vat, and was so badly scalded that he died soon afterwards.

James Darlington, age sixty-eight, who lived in the Ashton Gate district of Bristol, was found by a neighbor lying dead on a couch. At the inquest the daughter of the deceased, said that her sister and two brothers—aged nine, twelve and eleven years respectively—were almost starving. The father, who was a commercial traveler, was without work, and had had nothing to eat but a few potatoes for several days. The family lived for months on the neighbors' charity.

The Sheffield magistrates have decided that a public house billiard room is a bar within the meaning of the Children Act. John Wortley, St. Phillips, was summoned for allowing twenty-two children to be in his "bar" on Bank Holiday. The police saw a number of women and children in the billiard room. When the officers seen the mothers there lifted their children through the window into the back yard. The landlord was ordered to pay \$5, including costs.

In a house in Liverpool street, King's Cross, London, a young man and woman were found suffering from the effects of scaldic acid poisoning. The man is Cedric Diben, aged 26, a bank clerk, and the woman Emma Bennett, 23, a domestic servant. The couple, who passed as Mr. and Mrs. Diben, came to the house a fortnight ago from Wood Green. The man was out of employment.

HOUSE BESIEGED

Insane Man Barricades Home and Bars Constable.

A remarkable siege of a house—recalling that at St. Blazey, Cornwall, some months ago—in which a royal Irish constabulary man is the central figure, has taken place at Tullow, County Carlow. The man, whose name is Seale, apparently became insane, for his wife was heard screaming for help, and when a neighbor endeavored to enter the house, Seale fired at him.

At Clonmel last week a presentation consisting of an album and a cheque for £800 was made to Mr. Burke, who has resigned the position as Master of the Tipperary Hunt, a position which he has held for nearly 25 years. Much regret was felt at his retirement by the members of the Hunt where he had done such good work during his long term of office.

A three-year-old child named Anna Scott, daughter of a gardener in the employment of Mr. Irvine Tynan, County Armagh, was saved from certain death the other day by the timely assistance of a boy named Dolg. Hearing cries in a field, he ran to the spot, and found the child up to its neck in a swamp, from which he rescued her.

A competition to judge the live weight of a bullock proved a very popular feature of the Clonmel Horse and Cattle Show. There were 15 competitors. Mr. P. J. O'Reilly was first, with the exact weight; Mr. P. Carroll, of Mile Tree, and Mr. Barton, of Monfield, being second and third and only a few pounds out.

The outbreak of fever in Thurles still continues, and several fresh cases have been brought to the Thurles and Nenagh hospitals, within the last few days, and during the last week there have been several deaths, amongst them being Mr. Patrick Leamy, a well known and popular merchant in the town.

One night recently the residents of Ballyholme heard cries of distress from the sea, and on investigating, found that a yacht had stranded on a submerged reef, about two miles from shore. Two rescue parties went out, and took off four of the crew of six, the other two sinking to the yacht, which proved to be a racing yacht, the "Fugitive," from Bangor. She was safely re-loaded on the incoming tide, and brought to a safe anchorage.

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
