Company Agrees to Bring Out Four Thousand Settlers in Ten Years.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, April 11 .- What is virtually rovision for another land grant was introduced into the Legislature yesterday afternoon by Hon. W. H Hearst. The act is to aid the Lake Huron and Northern Ontario Railway, which has a line running north from Bruce Mines, on the north shore of ake Huron, now known as the Bruce

Mines and Algoma Railway. Only seventeen miles of the railway have been built, but the projected extension will be about 125 miles in length to the National Transcontinental, interecting both the Canadian Pacific and Canadian Northern Railways.

Big Land Grant.

Big Land Grant.

Former subsidies and land grants to the railway are repealed, and the proposal now is that after the line has been built, the railway is entitled to purchase from the Government in alternate sections, land to the extent of 4,000 acres per mile. The purchase price is to be twenty-five cents per acre for the first 3,000 acres, and fifty cents per acre for the balance up to 4,000 acres.

Government Conditions.

A right-of-way strip for transmission lines is reserved to the crown, as well, as all red and white pine and minerals. The Government will fix all conditions of settlement of arabic lands, and others will be subject to the forestry laws and regulations. After two years 250 bona fide settlers per year must be brought in for five years, and 500 settlers per year for the succeeding five years. Plants must be erected to handle all the timber provided by the settlers, Roads and bridges are to be constructed and schools erected for the settlers in their possession now.
