RAILWAYS SHOW A HEAVY INCOME DECREASE

Decision as to Rates in U. S. Expected Soon After Arguments.

[Canadian Press.]

Washington, D. C., April 27.—A decision by the Interstate Commerce Commission of the fundamental question involved in the eastern advance rate case—whether the present revenues of the roads are adequate—is expected within a few days after the conclusion of final arguments, which began here today.

The 35 railroad systems which are asking the 5 per cent increase in rates have filed the financial data concerning their lines for the first eight months of the current fiscal year. These figures indicated a loss in operating income of \$9,122,145, or a total loss in operation income of 26 per cent.
