VEALE GETS 5 YEARS FOR BURNING HOUSE

Ex-County Constable Pleaded Guilty To Serious Charge.

WOODSTOCK, Sept. 16. — Charles Veale, tried in the county jail by Judge Wallace today on a charge of arson, pleaded guilty to burning a house on Eli Barnum's farm at Springford, and also of sending threatening letters to an insurance company, and was sentenced to five years in Kingston Penitentiary. Veale refused to leave his cell today when asked to go to the courthouse to face his trial. He claimed he was taken ill. He is a big man, weighing about 250 pounds, and the jailers were in a quandary. Finally the judge and lawyers decided to go to Veale in the cell and conduct the case.

Oppose Home Work.
The women members of the Beavers' U. F. O. of East Zorro think that it is not up to them to spend part of their evenings explaining arithmetic, etc., to their children. At their monthly meeting they passed a resolution against giving junior pupils home work, the members taking the stand that when a teacher was paid for her services in a school they should do the teaching of arithmetic and other subjects in the children's heads during school hours, and not leave it for the mothers to do at night.

Suspended Sentence.
Clifford Ashden was today found guilty of criminal negligence, but the magistrate suspended sentence. Ashden was backing a car out of a local garage door when it ran over 6-year-old Mary Nokes, killing her almost instantly.

BUSINESS FAILURES DECREASE.
TORONTO, Sept. 16.—Business failures throughout Canada and Newfoundland for the week ending September 16, totalled 41, a decrease of one over the previous week, according to reports to R. G. Dun & Co. The bulk of the failures were reported from Quebec and Ontario, with nineteen and twelve, respectively. Alberta reported five failures, Nova Scotia two, Newfoundland two and British Columbia one. Manitoba, Saskatchewan, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island all show a clean sheet for the week, with no failures reported.

WARDEN TAYLOR MAY BE CHOICE OF NORFOLK LIBS.

Popular Port Dover Official Prominently Mentioned As Candidate.

SPLIT IN FARMERS' RANKS

Recent Telephone Controversy Reported To Have Caused Trouble.

SIMCOE, Sept. 16.—Warden R. M. Taylor of Port Dover is prominently mentioned as the Liberal candidate for Norfolk in the coming Dominion election. Although he has not consented to run, his supporters do not believe his attitude is a definite refusal. A retired druggist, Warden Taylor devotes most of his time to county affairs and bee culture. A close friend of Senator Proudfoot, and another prominent Liberal, he is a believer in a low tariff, and points to the vanished glory of Port Dover and Port Ryerse as an example of what protection did for those lake ports.

Did Big Business.
Port Dover, in low tariff days, did a land office business with ports across the lake, in fish and hides. Port Ryerse, a small summer resort, but not much more than the name, had large grain elevators within its boundaries, and was a regular port of call for lake steamers.

Activity is not confined to the five different reform clubs of Norfolk. Since the announcement of the retirement of Hon. W. A. Charlton, the Conservatives have been seeking in all directions to find a candidate. John S. Martin of Port Dover, known as the American Wyandotte king, and one of the largest poultrymen on the continent, has refused the candidature, according to reports. He is the only man who would be likely to make any kind of a showing outside Simcoe.

Cut Down Majority.
Although still Tory, Simcoe's majority for successive Conservative candidates has been whittled down until now it is believed Liberal and Conservative candidates would run neck and neck. But it is not Simcoe that counts in an election. The rural section would, beyond doubt, defeat any Meighen candidate, but even Conservative supporters admit that a strong Liberal candidate like Warden Taylor would make a showing in Townsend, Charlotteville and his own township, Woodhouse.

Although it is understood that Premier Meighen said he would not allow Norfolk to go to the Farmers by default, activity in both the Liberal and Conservative camps is based on something more tangible. It is the repeated report of a split among the Farmer ranks and the recent telephone controversy did it.

MORIN HELD ON ROBBERY CHARGE

Found Not Guilty of Conspiracy in Amherstburg Hold-Up.

WINDSOR, Sept. 16.—Found not guilty this afternoon at Sandwich by Judge J. J. Coughlin of conspiring to hold up and rob William Martin, paymaster of the McEachern Construction Company, Louis Morin, 25 years old, a private in the United States army, was ordered held by Crown Attorney G. Urquhart. It is charged that Morin entered and robbed the home of Henry Kille, farmer, Malden Township.

A paymaster Martin was held up and robbed of \$2,500, his company's payroll, near Amherstburg in November. Morin, whose sweetheart, Miss Beatrice Major, told the court that Morin admitted "being mixed up in the robbery," left Amherstburg for Chicago in January.

Barrister F. O. Kerby, counsel for Morin, successfully introduced evidence of an alibi. Walter Goodchild testified that Morin was with him at Bois Blanc at the time Martin was robbed.

May Submit Bylaw.
Unable to finance a project to acquire land for park purposes from the one owned by the public parks act, the park board will ask the council to submit a bylaw to the ratepayers in January, authorizing a debt issue of \$150,000.

The property the board desires to buy is on the west side. One parcel of land is on Church street, and a second is on Wyandotte street, near the public school.

When the board's requisition is dealt with by the council, Ed. Frank Mitchell will suggest that land on Douglass avenue, just outside the city limits, be appropriated if necessary for a park. The property is admirably adapted for athletic grounds and athletic field, the German asserts, being well wooded with huge maple and elm trees.

Will Start Monday.
With a debt issue of \$390,000 approved by the Provincial Government, work on extensions to the border str. railway, including the erection of power stations at Amherstburg and Tecumseh, will be started on Monday. Double tracks will be laid on East Wyandotte street and Ouellette avenue and a loop on Ferry and Pitt street from Sandwich street to Ouellette avenue. Trackless trolleys will be placed in operation on Ottawa street, which has been paved with sheet asphalt on a kerite base, the first pavement of its kind in Windsor.

KINGSTON CONSTABLE 3 SHOT BY BANDITS
KINGSTON, Sept. 16.—Police Constable J. J. Cotter of Kingston was shot in the left arm, and two other men, Stet Patterson, a taxi driver, and W. H. Lyons, a chauffeur, had a close shave when they endeavored to round-up the bandits this afternoon seven miles out on the Perth road. On hearing that the men were traveling in a stolen car, Cotter went in pursuit and called on them to surrender.

The band replied with a shot that brought the constable down, but Cotter, as he fell, fired the face of one of the outlaws with a bullet. Patterson endeavored to shoot Cotter to safety while a shower of bullets rained about him. The bandits made off in a stolen car. A posse in the city is now looking for them, and is in the hospital and is expected to recover.

BISHOP DECLINES TO DISCUSS REQUEST

HAMILTON, Sept. 16.—Word has been received here that Bishop Fallon of London has inherited \$100,000, left to him by a man whom he converted by a sermon preached in 1915, during the Eucharistic Congress at Montreal.

"I do not think a rumor of this kind is of public interest," declared Bishop Fallon to The Advertiser last night, when informed of the contents of the Hamilton dispatch. "It is purely a personal matter," he concluded.

COLORLESS COMMENT ON REMOVAL OF THE EMBARGO ON CATTLE

LONDON, Sept. 16.—(By Canadian Press).—Newspaper comment on the removal yesterday of the embargo on Canadian cattle is not extensive, and is rather colorless. The Daily Express, which took up the subject hotly earlier in the summer, remarks that the commission is conservative in their estimate of the extent of meat cheapening, but express content and leave the question to time and experience.

The Morning Post says the commission does not contain a single member who has any knowledge or connection with agriculture. The Post is not surprised at the hostility of Irish opinion to the subject, and declares that it interests Ireland more than home rule.

"This only a new step of the old, headless policy, cheapness at any price," declares the Post. The London editor of the Yorkshire Post asserts that the Canadian Government all along treated the question of agriculture while visiting here recently, expressed to the writer his emphatic opinion that any dominion government would be treating the question dangerously if it attempted, however, to influence or interfere with Britain's exclusion of any commodities.

SOUTH OXFORD LIBERALS WILL MEET SEPT. 30

Sweeping Victory Is Looked For In the Coming Election.

TILLSBURG, Sept. 16.—Ever since the memorable reception to Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King in Tillsburg the latter part of July all parties in South Oxford have been waiting to see what the others will do before naming any convention dates. Early in August the South Oxford Liberal executive met in Mount Elgin weeks before an election was announced, and decided to call a convention on September 30 at Mount Elgin to nominate a candidate for the federal elections, and this first public announcement will start one of the hottest election campaigns witnessed in Ontario.

South Oxford is an original Liberal stronghold, and possessing one of the ablest women's political organizations in the province, there is every indication of a sweeping Liberal majority. The Conservatives without doubt will nominate the present member, Donald Sutherland, as no other name has ever been mentioned, in fact, very few would even want their name to go before the convention, as defeat is a certainty.

The Liberal convention will throw wide open its doors and absolutely no candidate will be selected before the delegates designate their choice on September 30.

TEACHER NOMINATED.

BRANTFORD, Sept. 16.—A. W. Burt, teacher of the Brantford Collegiate Institute, was this evening nominated for the riding of Brantford in the coming federal election at a meeting of the Brantford branch of the Independent Labor party. It will be recalled that some time ago the Provincial L. P. executive cancelled the charter of the Brantford Independent

Labor party for its refusal to break away from M. M. MacBride, M.P.P. The charter was renewed, and it is this branch with the renewed charter which nominated Mr. Burt. The executive of the first L. P. met here tonight to make recommendation as to their candidate in the forthcoming election. This decision will be presented at a mass meeting to be held soon. M. M. MacBride, M.P.P., announced that he will not be a candidate.

PORTER MAY BE CANDIDATE.

Meetings have already been held in the riding of Brant in favor of W. C. Good, U. F. O. candidate.

MAY BE DEPORTED.
NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—Three hundred Armenians, mostly women and children, who came to the United States to escape the Turks, are held at Ellis Island for deportation back to Turkey because of an alleged technical flaw in the immigration law or its interpretation that prevents Armenian immigration altogether.
