JURY BLAMES TWO WHEN WOMAN DIES IN AUTO MISHAP

H. Cross and W. Hall Held Responsible for Death of Mrs.. Rosenfeldt.

HALL DISAPPEARED

Car Crashed Into Wall When Traveling Fifty Miles an Hour.

Toronto, May 17 .- A coroner's jury last night found that Herbert Cross and William Hall were equally responsible for the death of Mar Rosenfeldt, who died as a result of injuries she received when a moto car in which were Cross, Hall, Mis Gussie Slafer and William Swales ran up on the sidewalk on Dunda street, struck Mrs. Rosenfeldt, crash ed against the wall of a building, and zigzagged its way until it finally was stopped by a telephone pole. Hall made his escape after the car had stopped, and has not been located Cross is held on the charge of man-

The affair occurred on May 8. The evidence submitted last night went to show that the persons in the death ar had been drinking, that the car as going about fifty miles an hour, also that Hall was driving, but when the car had reached such a speed Cross grabbed the wheel, Miss Slafer

WILL SOON BE SURPLUS

Sir Henry Thornton Expresses Confidence in New York Interview.

Associated Press Despatch.

New York, May 17 .- That he had never been more optimistic regarding the future of the Canadian National Railways than he was at present; that he had not been hampered by political influence since accept-ing the presidency and that he was confident the huge annual deficit of the lines operated by the Canadian government would ultimately be a surplus was the hopeful outlook expressed to the Associated Press by Sir Henry Thornton, president of the C. N. R., who arrived in New York last night from Montreal for a series of business conferences.

Sir Henry, who is leaving tonight for the Niagara district, said that the meetings he will attend here con-cern only minor details of the United States connections of the National Railways. He stated he was not very well acquainted with the southern portion of Ontario, and was visiting it chiefly to familiarize himself with the country and ts transportation facili-ties and requirements.
