Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, March 13 .- Playing perfect defensive hockey and taking advantage of their openings on the attack, Canadiens defeated St. Patricks 2 to 9 here tonight and qualified to play in the finals for the N. H. L. champlonship.

St. Patricks could not do anything right, missing a flock of good chances to score by shooting wide after working inside the defence. Then Vezina was unbeatable in the Canadiens' net, Canadiens played one of their best games of the season. Though Vezina was his team's star. Sprague Clephorn and Coutu were great defensively, and the former figured in both of his team's goals, scoring the first in nine minutes, and giving Morenz the pass for the other 25 seconds from the end of the game. The Irish were inside a number of times, but Vezina turned in the best game that he has ever played on Toronto ice, and was helped considerably when every one of the locals, with the exception of Corbeau, missed anywhere from one to almost ten chances to flip the rubber into the net.
