BOY HAS SLIM HOPE IN FIGHT FOR LIFE

Donald Ward, Hit by Truck Saturday Morning, L Still Unconscious.

Donald Ward, 4-year-old son of Mrs. Joseph Ward, who was knocked down by a London Pure Meat Company truck in front of his home, No. 4 Stanley street, on Saturday morning, "has a fighting chance for recovery," it is reported at Victoria hospital, where the child has been in an unconscious condition for the past two days.

The accident happened while Mrs Ward was shopping on the market, at 10:30 o'clock Saturday morning. She had left the boy with his grandmother to play in the back yard of his home He ran onto Stanley street in pursuit of a ball, with which h had been playing, and in darting back acros the street to his home was struck by a truck driven by Horace McGuire. The boy was immediately taken to Victoria hospital, where X-ray examination revealed a

His condition shows a slight im-provement today, hospital physicians and Mrs. Ward say. He has not regained consciousness, but hope is held for his recovery. His mother has been in constant attendance at the child's bedside since he was ad-mitted to the hospital Saturday.

Health Is Much Improved, But May Require More Blood Transfusions.

Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the hydro-electric power commission, who has been under treatment for pernipital in Baltimore for the past three months, unexpectedly availed himself of his physicians' permit to leave on Saturday evening, and without notice to his London friends, quietly returned to "Headley" on Sunday after-

Sir Adam's condition is much improved as compared with that which caused his admssion to the Baltimore hospital, but he is tired after his journey, and will require a few days' rest before he is able to see anyone here. Despatches from Baltimore quote Dr. Futcher, the specialist who that his case in charge, as saying that Sir Adam is still a sufferer from anaemia after his six blood transfusions, and that it will be necessary for him to continue his treatment here.



DEAD NOW NUMBER 43

27 Others Injured in Saturday's Explosion—Comrades Heroic in Rescue Work.

Associated Press Despatch Dorstfeld, Germany, May 18 .- Th number of known dead in the mine explosion here Saturday has now reached 43 and 27 injured. The exploit of the miners' comrades in recovering the dead bodies and rescuing the wounded constitutes one of Make It Tough the heroic pages in the mining history of this region. The approach to the victims was both difficult and dangerous. Oxygen apparatus could not be be carried on the backs of the rescuers, but had to be dragged with difficulty through narrow passages. Many in the rescue expeditions were overcome by poisonous gases, but their places were heroically taken by thers.
Many of the rescuers worked 24
