TWO ARE KILLED IN DETROIT FIGHT

Negro, Policeman Slain and Another Officer Injured in Street Battle.

Detroit, Sept. 7.—Forty shots were fired early this evening in a street battle between negroes and policemen, and when the smoke had cleared away one bluecoat and an unidentified negro lay dead on the roadway and another officer was in receiving hospital with a bullet in his hip. The dead policeman is Frank Marchinowski, 32 years old. His partner, Frank Dombecky, 28 years old, is the wounded man.

Marchinowski and Dombecky were patrolling Michigan avenue at Golden in a department car when they saw a white man running, with a negro, brandishing a knife, pursuing him. They jumped out of their car and ran toward the negro, who drew a gun and started shooting. Marchinowski fell to the street with two bullet wounds in his chest. Dombecky fired at the negro and kept running toward him. The negro's gun jammed and Dombecky strangled him. His assailant struck the officer on the head with the butt of the pistol, but Dombecky succeeded in wrenching the weapon away from him. Dombecky fired twice and the negro dropped. He died as the policeman was telephoning for the police chief.

INDIAN WOMAN'S DEATH AROUSES SUSPICION

Vancouver, B.C., Sept. 5.—The body of an Indian woman was found on the sidewalk of Thirteenth street, early today. She was identified as Mary Brown, 60, of the Lytton reserve.

Suspicious circumstances surrounding her death have resulted in a request for an inquest by C. C. Perry, Indian agent. One eye was badly bruised and the woman's mouth was pressed into the dust of the street. Death appeared to have been due to suffocation.

LAVERGNE ACCLAIMS MEIGHEN AS DUAL LANGUAGE CHAMPION

Canadian Press Despatch.
Montreal, Sept. 7.—Open support of Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen was voiced last evening at a political meeting at St. Denis-sur-Richelieu by Armand Lavergne in an outspoken address.

Mr. Lavergne accompanied Hon. Andre Fauteux, and in the course of his delivery made reference to the

opposition leader and the conscription bill of 1917. Mr. Lavergne charged that French-Canadians could only blame themselves if they had suffered compulsory military service, because, he contended, they had paved the way for participation in the empire's wars by their "idolatrious support of Sir Wilfrid Laurier."

The Quebec Nationalist declared that the French-Canadian members of the House of Commons had failed

to uphold the rights of the French language throughout the country, and said that in this respect Mr. Meighen was a better defender of French than they, inasmuch as he had stated in London, Ont., that "if returned to power, he would endeavor to make the teaching of French obligatory in all the provinces."

FIX BATTLE ZONE ROADS.
Fez, French Morocco, Sept. 7.—The French troops along the front continued to mark time yesterday, with the exception of the engineers and other technicians, who were busy making good roads and tuning up the transport service generally for the proposed French drive against the Rifians.

LONG TERM BONDS WILL GO IN HOME MARKET

Previous Success of Domestic Refunding Operations Paves Way For More.

Canadian Press Despatch.
Toronto, Sept. 7.—A report was current in financial circles here today that the dominion government is planning to complete its financial

program for the year by the issue of long-term bonds in Canada. This report follows closely upon the announcement that the acting minister of finance was retiring \$30,000,000 of maturing short-term obligations in New York by the issue of \$70,000,000 of one-year notes.

If the current rumor is correct it will mean that the dominion government has continued its policy of placing its long-term loans in Canada. In 1923 the refunding operation consisted entirely of twenty-year and five-year bonds, all of which were placed here, while last year the long-term issue was made in Canada and the one-year notes placed with a New York syndicate.
