ACADIANS MEET IN ANNUAL CONVENTION

Large Number Attend Opening Ceremonies at Neguac on Sunday.
The annual celebration and convention of the Society of the Assumption of an international Acadian organization, were begun Sunday at Neguac, Northumberland county, with a solemn high mass in the parish church at 9 o'clock in the forenoon. At 3 o'clock in the afternoon there were patriotic addresses. The list of speakers included Dr. M. N. Adjutor Rivard, of Laval University, Montreal; A. Gagnon, I. L. B. of Quebec, Hon. P. J. Veniot, of Bathurst; Rev. Thomas Albert, of Shippegan, and Rev. W. Sormany of Rogersville. The steamer Alexandra made a special trip to Neguac Sunday morning, returning that evening, and about 150 people from Newcastle, Douglastown and Chatham, took advantage of the opportunity offered to attend the ceremonies.
The convention, with a picnic, was continued yesterday and there was a large attendance. The Society of the Assumption has among its membership residents of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, New England States, and Louisiana, where many of the descendants of the Acadians reside.—Chatham Commercial.

MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

Lengthy Discussion Over Assessment—Cost of New Fire Station.
A meeting of the council was held last evening. His Worship Mayor Murray presiding. There were present Councillors Devereaux, Matthews, Currie, Bissett and Dickie.
The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.
A communication from the School Board asking for funds was read and laid on the table.
James Louden was given permission to install a gasoline tank at his garage.
W. H. Gray wrote complaining that after every heavy rain his basement was flooded. Referred to Water and Sewerage Department.
A letter from the Barrett Co. of Chatham asking for the loan of the steam roller was read. This offered \$200.00 a month for the use of same, and transportation both ways. The request was granted.
An offer of \$350.00 for the team of horses was accepted, delivery to be made when motor fire equipment arrives.
Coun. Currie brought up the matter of license for dance halls. The matter was held over for advice of solicitor.
The council then went into committee of the whole to consider the assessment, Coun. agram in the chair.
The matter of assessment was discussed at considerable length. During this discussion it was brought out that the new fire station had to date cost about \$75,000 and the roof and some concrete work had yet to be completed, besides the erection of some necessary outbuildings. Coun. Currie's suggestion that \$1000 be placed in the appropriation for parks was not entertained. So much time was taken up with discussion of various items that the assessment was not agreed to and will be again taken up at a meeting to be held Friday evening.
On motion the Treasurer was authorized to place \$2000.00 to credit of the School Board.
The Council then adjourned.

SCHOOLS RE-OPEN MONDAY WEEK

Parents Should Make Application at Once for Permits for New Pupils.
The town schools will re-open after the summer holidays on Monday morning, Aug. 30th. Up-to-date very few permits have been issued by the Secretary, only four having been applied for up until Monday night. It does not necessarily follow however that there will not be the usual number issued this year. In fact it is expected a larger number than in former years will be applied for. In this respect The Graphic would point out the importance of parents making application early. It is decidedly unfair to the school management to wait until the last moment for permits as it places them in such a position as to be unable to make arrangements for the admission of new pupils, a condition of affairs which should not be, and one which only the parent is responsible for. Twenty-six teachers will be employed this year. Last year there were but twenty-one. Of those employed last year six have resigned their positions which will make eleven new teachers on the teaching staff when school opens on Monday week. All teachers have already been engaged, but so far it has been impossible to assign them their particular position, brought about largely by parents not placing the Board in a position to do so.

CLOSE OF SECOND TRAIN

Second Accident Narrowly Averted at Moffats When Maritime Wrecked.
The fact that a second serious wreck was only averted by the prompt action of the driver on the Ocean Limited a week ago last Monday, at the wreck at Moffats, has not been given to the public, but has been kept very quiet.
It appears that the crew of the Ocean Limited, which followed the wrecked Maritime express at about a seven hour interval was not notified of the wreck, and was given no orders covering same. As the Limited was running a half hour late she was coming along at a lively clip, when rounding the curve above Moffats the fireman noticed the wrecking crane on the main line and shouted to the engineer who put on the emergency brakes, pulling up the train within twenty feet of the wreck. The train was stopped so suddenly that a lady passenger was thrown over the back of a seat in the first class coach and had her collar bone broken, besides receiving a severe shaking up.
It is said that the officials from Campbellton were all at the wreck, and that no signals were put out to protect the main line approaches. No doubt some emeritic marks will be awarded if the above is true.

SLIGHT DROP IN FOOD PRICES

During July Cost of Weekly Budget Dropped Slightly.
Ottawa, Aug. 18.—During July the cost of weekly budget of staple foods dropped slightly, according to the figures given in current issue of the Labor Gazette. The average was \$16.84 at the middle of July as against \$16.92 in June; \$13.77 in July, 1919, and \$7.42 in July, 1914. The index number of wholesale prices again declined, being 346.3 for July, as compared with 349.3 for June 29-30 for July 1919 and 134.6 for July 1914.

ASK IMPROVEMENT MAIL SERVICE

I. N. R. Section Has Very Poor Mail Service at Present.
A meeting of the Board of Trade was held in Mr. P. St. Shannon's office last Friday evening to discuss the matter of an improved mail service for the I. N. R.
It was pointed out that if a Kedgewick business man wrote to Campbellton on an important matter, he could not get an answer until Friday as there were no express trains and no mail on Wednesday or Thursday. This was a very important matter. The need of an adequate telephone service for that district was also discussed.
A committee of five was appointed to take charge of both these matters and press for an improvement.
The committee has prepared a memorial which has been forwarded to Supt. Margin of the C. N. R. and it is hoped some measure of relief can be given.

WANTS \$12,000 FOR BILL SHARON

Archie Alcorn Offered to Sell Fast Trotter to Boston Parties.
A Moncton despatch says that Bill Sharon, 211 1/2, the Fredericton bred trotter owned by Archie Alcorn, the Blackville lumberman is now priced at \$12,000 in American funds. The fact that the price had gone up \$2,000 became known Saturday when Mr. Alcorn was asked by parties in Boston to name a price on the big chestnut trotter owned by Archie Alcorn, the \$12,000 was the figure for "immediate sale."
The inquiry came from a man who had acted before for Tommy Murphy, the Poughkeepsie, N. Y., owner and driver, who for several seasons has led Grand Circuit money winners. It also became known that Bill Sharon is entered in the Boston handicap, the revival of the Readville Derby event of a few years ago and, so far as known, he is the only one from "Down East."

MOOSE JUMPED ON THEIR AUTO

Occupants Scared But Kept on Going Carrying Moose for a Distance.
Fredericton, Aug. 17.—Simon Budovitch and Harry Valensky, two local Jews, engaged as cattle dealers, had the biggest scare of their young lives last night when a monster moose suddenly leaped upon the radiator of a Ford truck in New Maryland, while they were enroute to the city with several lambs they had purchased. They were going along at a fast rate of speed when the moose suddenly jumped upon the radiator of the car, smashing the hood and crashing through the windshield.
After the crash the Jews did not stop their car, instead Budovitch "stepped on her," and the little Ford just rambled right along, moose and all, until they struck a big bump, which shook off the moose. The municipal guard striking it as it fell to the road.

BIG PLANT FOR TOBIQUE PLANNED

Fraser Co. Limited Plan to Erect Big Pulp Mill There.
Fredericton, N. B., Aug. 18.—In preparation for proceeding with the construction of dams on the Tobique River and a pulp and paper manufacturing plant at Tobique Narrows, a few miles from the town of Andover in Victoria County the Fraser Companies Limited, who now operate several pulp mills and about a dozen lumber plants in New Brunswick and Quebec, are said to be obtaining options on properties on which to carry out their immense new project.
Hon. F. J. Tweeddale who has just returned from spending several days in Victoria County, said this morning it was generally known on the Tobique that the Fraser interests were about ready to start work under the charter they obtained from the provincial legislature last spring for a \$10,000,000 developments scheme.
