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BRO. ARNOLD ON IRELAND.

HE TALKS ABOUT MATTERS IN THE GREEN ISLE.

The People of That Country Do Not Want Separation, but to be Governed on the Same Lines as Canada—Signs of Progress.

Rev. Brother Arnold is spending a few days in Toronto, arriving from Montreal on last Friday.

The principal object of his visit is to accompany some young Irish relatives on the occasion of his recent visit to see safely received within the walls of St. Joseph's Convent.

Those who know Brother Arnold take eleven years ago, before he left Toronto to take charge of St. Anne's School in Montreal.

He has not changed in him to-day. He has the same happy spirit and untiring energy which made him a universal favorite here and caused his departure to be regretted.

The World talked with Brother Arnold last night at La Salle, where he is staying, about what he saw in Ireland and the feeling pervading the people there on the subject of Home Rule.

As far as his own observation goes, he said, "I have seen nothing more than I have seen in this country. The reports sent to the newspapers here are all false. I saw Davitt in Dublin and spent a day with Archbishop Coyle. The people are a unit on the national question, but you must not think that they want separation."

"The desire of their heart is to have the same system as that which governs Canada. Not only do the Catholics want to have the same system as that which governs Canada, but the Protestants as well. As for the separatists, they are but a few and of the same character as the New York agitators."

"What men are the most popular in Ireland? There are four and they stand thus: 1. CHARLES STURTEVANT FARNELL, 2. JOHN DILLON, 3. MICHAEL DAVITT, 4. WILLIAM O'BRIEN.

It is the opinion of the Irish nation, as I found it, that a more useful man than William O'Brien does not exist.

"How about the feeling in London and other parts of England, and found a desire to give Ireland what she wants? Cardinal Manning is an advocate for Home Rule on Canadian lines."

"Are not some of the English Catholics opposed to the movement?" "A few of them are, but only a very few. The great bulk are working for Home Rule."

"When do you think the population will be large enough to support a Home Rule?" "I think it will be large enough to support a Home Rule."

"How about the condition of Ireland? Is it improving?" "Yes, it is. You see it is 89 years since I had been in it, and the change was for the better. The population was larger. Now Ireland is chiefly a grazing country."

"Will you visit any other parts of Europe?" "Yes, I will visit France. Athens is making more real friends in England and Ireland than in any other part of Europe."

"What is the result of your visit to Montreal?" "The result of my visit to Montreal is that I have seen a great deal of the people who are working for Home Rule."
