MILITARY CYCLING,

Q.O.R. Wheelmen Ride to Hamilton Over Bad Roads and in Darkness.

Up to the present time the use of cycles in the Canadian militia has been but little cultivated and the effort of the Victoria

Rifles of Montreal and the Dufferin Rifles of Brantford some years ago to form a cycle section seemed but short lived. Mounted as they were on the old ordinaries their efficiency was never established and their use seemed to be restricted to an occasional run around the city streets.

The Queen's Own, while not laying claim to any recognized cycle section, have as the finest foundation for such of any corps in the Dominion, and the work performed by them on two different occasions has been of the most satisfactory nature. On Saturday the Q.O.R., in the face

of dire prophecies as to the result of endeavoring to take a section over the Lake Shore road to Hamilton, and with the idea of proving that in time of need it was possible, not only to send information by cycles, but every other means of communication was impossible, but also to move an armed body quickly from one point to another, sent a section of 10 riders, under Lieut. Baldwin from the Drill Shed, and despite the bad state of the roads reached Hamilton in good time with the section complete and every man in condition to do whatever was required of him. Owing to a rain storm over an hour in starting

the original plan of pushing through for support in Hamilton had to be abandoned and a halt called for supper at Oakville. The only furnished another argument as to the utility of cycles, as the distance from Oakville to Hamilton was covered in darkness, thus rendering any chance of seeing in what condition the roads were out of the question. These riders had never been together before and some had never ridden any distance outside the city, so that the performance is even more creditable than if they had been in training for the run. The time to be made was not the object, the main object being to

bring the entire section into their destination together and to keep them well under control throughout the entire distance. The time made was indeed creditable, considering the state of the roads, the run from Oakville in darkness and the distance considerably longer than the run taken last spring from Hamilton to Niagara Camp. The time for the half section was 3:35; Leaving the Drift Shed at 3:35, the Huntley reached at 2:53; the section to 10 minutes; and the run to Port Credit was 5 minutes; and Port Credit was reached at 3:55. After a rest of 10 minutes here a start was made for Oakville.

which was reached at 5 o'clock. Owing to the fast gathering darkness it was decided to halt there for supper, and the run to Hamilton in pitch darkness was started at 6.15, reaching that city as the clocks were striking 9. The section returned to Toronto by train Saturday night.
