—In addition to other portions of
the Province the Annapolis Valley
has been honored with the presence of
their Royal Highnesses the Duke and
Duchess of Connaught and Princess
Patricia, their charming daughter. In
1884 our noble sovereign visited An-
napolis Royal and was there re-
ceived with a right royal welcome.
History repeats itself, inasmuch as
the welcome accorded our visitors
throughout the Valley last Saturday
was of the most loyal nature. Al-
though Governor-General for but a
short period of time, His Royal
Highness has already endeared him-
self to the hearts of all the King's
subjects in this great Dominion. The
same may be said of the Duchess of
Connaught and Princess Patricia.
The Governor-General has held some
of the most important commands in
the British Empire, and has always
been received with the greatest en-
thusiasm, but in no case could the
welcome have been more cordial than
in Nova Scotia, and we venture to
say that the Valley has lived fully up
to its reputation, and has added an-
other gem to its history in its latest
evidence of loyalty to the throne.

The weather on Saturday last was
truly "King's weather," the vast as-
semblages at Middleton and Annapolis
Royal were loud in their de-
monstrations of welcome, and every-
thing passed off satisfactorily.

We sincerely trust that the visit to
Nova Scotia will be productive of the
best results to H.R.H. the Duchess,
whose health of late has prevented
her from taking part in other func-
tions in Canada, and we also hope
that at a not distant date their
Royal Highnesses may see fit to visit
our Province once again on a more
extended tour, so that other towns
may share in their expressions of love
and loyalty to His Majesty, as well
as to the youngest and only surviv-
ing son of "Victoria the Good."

Mr. Thos. F. Anderson, the well-
known Boston writer, who has done
so much for Nova Scotia, and es-
pecially Digby, as a summer resort,
arrived here Tuesday from Boston via
Yarmouth, and will spend a few days
in this vicinity before leaving for
Antigonish, where he has been asked
to give an address on the opportu-

Cadets in Camp at Aldershot

SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT.

Aldershot, Aug. 11.—There are from
1200 to 1300 boys under canvas here
and the weather being favorable so
far, all are well and enjoying camp.
These lads represent nearly every
town and city in the Maritime
Provinces, Sydney, St. John, Char-
lottetown, Woodstock and Halifax
sending the largest contingents.
Bridgetown has eight scouts to her
credit in command of Sgt. Albert
Burns as follows:—

Gordon Charlton, Tom Forden,
Primrose, Clarence Troop, Shirley
Miller, Donald Messenger, Earl Craig
and Clarence Kinsey. Rev. F. Un-
derwood is also in camp and one of
the Chaplains. Bridgetown boys are
attached to the 4th Battalion of
Sydney. Capt. J. E. Morse is in
command of No. 3. Battalions and
Capt. Rieley the 1st Battalion.

Aug. 18th.—The church parade to-
day was a novel sight. The High-
landers from St. John dressed in
kilts with their bag pipes band were
a unique sight. The moving pic-
ture man was along and got a good
view of the brigade marching past, so
no doubt, the Bridgetown people
will have an opportunity to see them.

A silver band of twenty-four musici-
ans from Sydney is a pleasing fea-
ture of the camp. The Y.M.C.A.,
under the direction of Fraser Mar-
shall is doing a good work in their
usual way.

A sad event in the drowning of a
lad by the name of Martell in Kelly's
Lily Pond, took place this afternoon.
Owing to the double bottom of this
lake it is considered a difficult task
to recover the body. The lad hailed
from Halifax, age sixteen years.

The body of Martell was found in
about three feet of water an hour
after his disappearance. He did not
rise to the surface, his body being
sucked down by the muddy bottom.
The drowning of Martell will mean
the enforcement of strict regulations
in regard to leaving the grounds. No
boys will be allowed to cross the
lines without special leave of ab-
sence.

All but three of the Bear River
contingents were sent home on Sat-
urday on account of refusing to sub-
mit to the vaccination regulation.

sembled to meet their Royal High-
nesses. The Royal visitors arrived at
2.45, and conveyed to the band stand,
where an address was presented by
Mayor Short, to which His Royal
Highness replied briefly. An auto
ride around town, to the accompani-
ment of great enthusiasm by the
population, concluded the functions in
Nova Scotia, and the Royal party
boarded the Earl Grey at the Gov-
ernment pier and sailed at 4.15 p.m.
for St. John.

On arrival the Digby battery fired
a Royal salute, while a guard of hon-
or, consisting of one hundred men
and a military band from the Hal-
ifax Garrison under Capt. Howard,
were present. Mayor Slater was also
present.

The Royal Canadian Regiment
Band returned from Digby yesterday
morning, having accompanied the
Royal party on the tour through the
Annapolis Valley. The Band has
gone to Petawawa, to go under can-
vas with the regiment, and will be
absent for about a month.
