ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH, Smith's Falls, recently enlarged and refitted, was reopened on Sabbath, 8th inst., by the Rev. Principal Grant.

ON Friday evening, 6th inst., about eighty of the congregation of New Glasgow and Rodney gathered at the manse and took full possession.

THE opening services of High River church, in the Drumbo settlement, were conducted by Rev. J. Herdman, of Calgary, morning and afternoon.

THE two reverend gentlemen delivered addresses, instead of a sermon, to the largest body of people who have thus far assembled in that locality to participate in religious exercises.

THE building is 20x30 feet, with a vestibule, and has, in cash and labour, cost about \$700, of which \$125 was a contribution from the Church and Manse Building Fund of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

THE site, on a hill, is most commanding, being at the mouth of High River, near its junction with the Bow, and the church can be seen from every side for a long distance.

THE Rev. R. A. Munro, ordained missionary, will have the care of the congregation, his supervision including the High River, Pine Creek and Sheep Creek districts.

IT is but proper to state that all denominations were represented among the contributors to the building fund and in the large body of attendants at the opening exercises.

THE Dunbow settlement is a typical Alberta settlement, and its rapid progress illustrates the speed at which certain parts of the district are filling up.

THREE years ago a few pioneers, mostly bachelors, had made homes there. The families, and what may be spoken of as the church-going people, have nearly all come in during the last eighteen months, many within the last two months.

THEY come from Scotland, England and Eastern Canada, and are understood to be away above the average in intelligence and industry.

THEY have already a school-house (this independent of the Industrial School located at High River), in charge of a well-qualified teacher, Miss Maxwell, and now this new edifice will afford another rallying point for the settlers and for the promotion of the spiritual and intellectual improvement of the district.

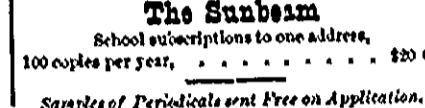
