(INCOMING TELEGRAM)

THE RIGHT HONOURABLE PIERRE ELLIOTT TRUDEAU PRIME MINISTER, GOVERNMENT OF CANADA OTTAWA. ONTARIO

MARCH 10, 1970

MY DEAR PRIME MINISTER:

I HAVE RECEIVED YOUR LETTER OF MARCH 7 REGARDING QUEBEC'S ROLE IN CANADA'S PARTICIPATION IN THE FORTHCOMING NIAMEY CONFERENCE AND IN THE AGENCY FOR CULTURAL AND TECHNICAL COOPERATION. I HAVE STUDIED THIS LETTER AND ALL THE RELEVANT DOCUMENTS WITH MY CABINET COLLEAGUES.

WE WERE SORRY TO NOTE THAT AN OBVIOUS DISAGREEMENT PERSISTS ON A NUMBER OF BASIC POINTS, DESPITE NEGOTIATIONS WHICH HAVE LASTED SEVERAL WEEKS.

THUS, YOUR MOST RECENT PROPOSALS REGARDING THE CANADIAN DELEGATION'S VOTE CLEARLY DIVERGE FROM THE SPIRIT OF THE FORMULA ALREADY AGREED UPON BETWEEN US. THIS SAME FORMULA HAD. HOWEVER, PROVED SATISFACTORY FOR FOUR MEETINGS OF THE CONFERENCE OF EDUCATION MINISTERS AND THE FIRST NIAMEY CONFER-ENCE LAST YEAR. THAT IS WHY WE HAD ADOPTED IT ONCE MORE, WORD FOR WORD, WHILE TAKING CARE TO ENSURE THAT IT IN NO WAY PREVENTED THE CANADIAN DELEGATION FROM REGISTERING ITS VOTE ON MATTERS WITHIN FEDERAL COMPETENCE. THIS ADDITION, WHICH WE OURSELVES SUGGESTED, WAS DESIGNED TO ALLOW FOR THE POSSIBILITY THAT MATTERS OF CONCERN TO THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT MIGHT ARISE IN CONNECTION WITH THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE AGENCY. BUT, YOUR NEW PROPOSAL MEANS, IN EFFECT, THAT THE CANADIAN DELEGATION, LED BY A FEDERAL MINISTER, COULD VOTE ON ANY MATTER, EVEN THOSE QUESTIONS WITHIN OUR STRICT COMPETENCE. AND EVEN IF QUEBEC
