***TRANSFER OF MARINE AGENCY, PARRY SOUND, ONT.**

Question No. 2,034—Mr. Aiken:

1. Has the government any plans for transferring the headquarters of the Parry Sound marine agency from the town of Parry Sound to another location?

2. Is the government making plans for the establishment of a Department of Transport marine base at Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario and, if so (a) for what purpose (b) will any of the duties now carried out at Parry Sound be transferred to Sault Ste. Marie?

Mr. Jean-Charles Cantin (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Transport): 1. No.

2. Yes. To carry out increasing responsibilities, the marine services branch of the department has found it necessary to proceed with plans for the establishment of various additional facilities in the great lakes area, including new marine support bases, one of which will be located at Sault Ste. Marie. This, in turn, will require the evolution of a regional concept of organization and management, in line with the concepts of delegation recommended by the Glassco royal commission. While this could lead, in due course, to some readjustments in functions between the various marine bases, to take care of the existence of new facilities, and

the increased amount of work to be carried out, detailed plans in this regard have not yet been developed. As indicated, the Parry Sound marine agency is to be retained.
