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should increase the sockeye and pink salmon runs extensively in the next few years.

However, the situation with regard to the cohoe and spring salmon stock is not nearly so rosy; in fact it is unsatisfactory. In this regard, possibly we had better take a lesson from our neighbour to the south, who has greatly increased his stock by the hatchery method, in spite of the many difficulties that have had to be overcome. I refer to such obstacles as dams, pollution and a limited number of suitable rivers. None of these obstacles confronts us, except possibly pollution, and even that is present to lesser degree. Although we have no dams to contend with yet, and an unlimited number of suitable rivers, cohoe and spring salmon stock is decreasing at an alarming rate, and for two basic reasons. The first is the heavy fishing pressure and the second is the damage caused to our natural spawning streams and watershed areas by indiscriminate logging practices. Our natural spawning channels are still, and heaven forbid it should ever be otherwise, the best areas for salmon stocks. It would seem therefore that the preservation of these stocks through the preservation of our natural spawning channels should receive top priority from our Department of Fisheries. On the west coast I have seen, and I continue to get reports about, the damage caused to these spawning beds and watershed areas by logging operators of both small and large magnitude. The necessary legislation exists to prohibit such conduct. I therefore urge that this legislation be enforced—and that it be rigidly enforced.

In so far as salmon rehabilitation is concerned, I would recommend that the Department of Fisheries conduct a survey of all the streams on the west coast suitable for the introduction of spawning channels. May I offer for special consideration the Kennedy lake system of Vancouver island?

I keep referring to this problem of pollution. I have referred to it this afternoon because I am quite convinced our rivers, streams and lakes are being polluted at an alarming rate. I am convinced also that if any
