POINT OF ORDER

MR. ANDRE—IMPOSITION OF LEVY UNDER PETROLEUM ADMINISTRATION ACT

Madam Speaker: I will now rule on the point of order that was raised earlier by the hon. member for Calgary Centre (Mr. Andre). The hon. member raised a point of order to say that the procedure followed by the Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources (Mr. Lalonde) was not the correct procedure.

The hon. member says that the ways and means motion proposes to amend the Petroleum Administration Act which was not initiated by a ways and means motion. The hon. member is probably aware that the parent act was in fact initiated by both a ways and means motion and the notice of motion for introduction with an accompanying royal recommendation. But he is, of course, correct when he says that the provision of the parent act which is now to be amended was not covered in the original ways and means motion.

There has been considerable argument about the legality of the particular procedures which the minister is choosing in the present case, but the House will know that the Chair can never pronounce upon issues of a legal nature, it can rule only on questions of order. Therefore I must return to the precise point of order involved in this issue, that is to say, has the minister acted within the ambit of the standing order in tabling a notice of ways and means motion. The substance of that motion, or the effect of that notice, can be of no concern to the Chair. Hon. members will be aware that our records will show that there are many ways and means motions which were never adopted.

I therefore must find that the procedures followed so far have been in order. However, this does not preclude the Chair from entertaining further points of order in connection with the matter at further stages in the process.

I want to close by thanking hon. members for their careful attention and assistance to the Chair in this difficult point of procedure.

The House had agreed that we would revert to statements by ministers after this ruling. It is the pleasure of the House to revert now to statements by ministers?

Some hon. Members: Agreed.
