AMERICAN COLLEGE RUGBY'S
AWFUL TOLL.
CHICAGO, Nov. 24.—Fourteen players
were killed and 115 injured in football
games in the season which virtually closed
ed Saturday. This record of casualties
is only slightly below that of 1912, when
13 players met death and 183 were in-
jured.

These figures were compiled from
news reports and published here today.
The injured include only those who suf-
fered broken bones, torn ligaments, se-
vere strains and sprains and internal in-
juries.
Of the 14 deaths, 12 succumbed to in-
juries occurring this year. Charles
Switzer, formerly a Hamlin University
player, died Nov. 17, at St. Paul, follow-
ing a complication of disease resulting
from injuries sustained several years
ago. The injured players included a broken
neck or spinal injuries. Only two uni-
versity players were killed.

hockey team this season, composed of
first-class players. At a meeting held
there the players were selected and the

management committee, B. K. Allen, O.
D. Shaffer and Dr. Chapin.

Aberdeen and Britannia were the two
new clubs admitted to the Interprovincial
Amateur Hockey Union at the meeting
held Saturday night, they being given a
franchise in the Ottawa section. The
Central, or Montreal, section, owing to
the withdrawal of the Victoria, Mon-
treal Amateur Athletic Association,
was abandoned, so that the applications
of Laval and McGill were turned down.
With only McGill, Laval, and perhaps St.
Catharics, the executive of the league
could not see their way to forming a
central section this season. M.A.A.A. and
Victoria were allowed to retain their
franchise in the union.
