British Foreign Office Throws Light on Diplomatic Exchanges.

CUNNINGLY WORDED

(Continued From Page 1.) many quarters as a reasonable offer of friendship from Germany. In these circumstances it may be as well to publish a statement of facts compile from the official records here.
"Early in 1912 the German chancellor sketched to Lord Haldane (then British lord high chancellor) the for-eign formula as one which would meet

the views of the imperial government Germany's Proposals.
"First, the high contracting partie assure each other mutually of their desire for peace and friendship.
"Second, they will not, either unprovoked attack upon the other, or join in any combination or design against the other for the purpose of aggression, or become a party to any plan of naval or military enterprise alone or in combination with any other power, directed to such an end, and declare themselves not to be bound

by any such engagement. "Third, if either of the high con tracting parties become entangled in war with one or more powers, in which it cannot be said to be the aggressor the other party will at least observe toward the power so entangled bene volent neutrality and will use its ut-most endeavor for the localization of the conflict. If one of the high contracting parties is forced to go to war by obvious provocation by a third party, they bind themselves to enter into an exchange of views concerning

their attitude on such a conflict. "Fourth, the duty of neutrality which arises out of the preceding article has no application in so far as it may not be reconcilable with existing agreements which the high contracting parties already have made.

"Fifth, the making of new agree ments which render it impossible for either of the parties to observe neutrality towards the other, beyond what is provided by the preceding limitation, is excluded in conformity with the provisions of Article 2.
"Sixth, the high contracting parties

declare they will do all in their power to prevent differences and misunderstandings arising between them and

"On the other hand, no such de parture, however serious the provoca-tion, would have been possible for this country, which was bound by no alliances, with the exception of those of Japan and Portugal, while the making of fresh alliances was pro-hibited by article 5. In a word, as appeared still more evident later, there was to be a guarantee of absolute neutrality on one side, but not on the other. OPENED CANADA'S GREATEST SCHOOL

Central Technical Building Scene of Impressive Cere mony Last Night.

CROWDS INSPECTED IT

Hon, Sir John Hendrie Presides-Many Prominent Citizens Present.

Lt.-Col. Sir John Hendrie, as a fitting sequel to officially opening the Canadian National Exhibition on Monday, officially opened Canada's greatest institution for lindustrial education, the Toronto Central Technical High School, last night.

Thousands thronged the immense building. The main entrance, on Lippin-cott stree was resiged by a throng, reminding those seeking entrance of big political gatherings requiring overflow meetings. Two thousand invitations were issued for the opening ceremonies in the auditorium of the building, but it was first-comers only who could get into the room, as the assembly hall will seat only 1300. Fortunately, Principal McKay had a large staff of guides detailed to lead the throngs of visitors to inspect the chief feature departments.

MNes of Corridors.

The myriad electric lights thruout the miles of corridors contained in the school revealed a scene of gorgeous splendor and elicited general admiration. Great expectations had been raised by the knowledge that two million dollars had been exponded in the erection of the building, including the cost of the site. The corridors, over four hundred feet long, giving access to 320 rooms, presented an impressive scene as the public surged along them, all expectant and eager to see the library, gyinnasium and the great laboratories equipped with machinery of the most perfect design, workmanship and highest quality.

Building Dedicated.

The dedication ceremonies in the assembly hall began at 8.15.

Chairman Hodsson of the board of education asked the audience to rise and sing "the long metre doxology."

His Lordship the Bishop of Toronto offered the following dedication prayer: O, God, the creator and preserver of all, mankind, from whom cometh every good and perfect gift of wisdom and understanding, accept, we pray Thee, our dedication of this place, and use it for the edification of all who shall be gathered here for instruction in arts and craft, and for skill in handiwork and science. Give to the principal and teachers diligence in preparation for their work and appress to learn. Whatsoever their hands find to do in classroom or study may they do it with their might, heartily, as unto Thee and not as unto men. Use them as the honor instruments in Thy hands for promoting the well being or the communities in which they live. Help them to build up the moral and spiritual, as well as the material and social fabric of the common life; and enable them so faithfully to serve Thee here that they may be counted worthy to serve and iabor with Thee mid the joys of Thy heavenly kingdom, thru Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.



MILLION DOLLAR FINE FOR WOMAN

Ninety-Nine Year Sentence in Jail Goes With It.

ACTION WARRANTED

Judge Does Not Want to See the Prisoner Any More.

MUSKOGEE, Okla. Sept. 1.—Police Judge Ed. I. Williams yesterday fined Mandy Simon, a Creek Indian woman, \$1,000,000 and sentenced her to serve 99 years in jail. She has been in the police court here virtually every week for several years.

Julge Williams said he set the fine Nso high because he did not want her to ever be at large again. The judge's actions were recorded in the record books of the police department and he was supported by Chief of Police Joe

Depew.
"Mandy has been a continual pest to the City of Muskogee for years," said Judge Williams. "She was always causing trouble by getting drunk and doping up. Counting all the times she has been sentenced in this court, I would estimate that, had she served out all her time she would have served some 15 years. I will see to it personally that she spends the remainder of her days in the Muskogee City

On numerous occasions, Judge Willams had extended leniency to the woman. Several times he got her positions and released her from jail, and once got her a home. Man'y was re-leased by the judge on her last appearance in court, Aug. 16. However, she came back to town Tuesday, got drunk and was arrested.
