READVILLE, Mass., Aug. 27 .- Cheeny .07%, owned by John Mulkey, a farmer boy of Waxahachie, Texas, and driven by John P. Fleming, another Texan, won the fourth renewal of the American Trotting Derby at the opening of the Grand C. cruit meeting here today in a thrilling finish by a half length.
