

VARSITY SOCCER TEAM WINS

Beat All New York in First International Game by 2 Goals to 1.

Jack O'Brien of Philadelphia and Tommy Burns (Noah Brusse) of Galt, Ont., fought twenty terrific rounds before the Pacific Athletic Club to a draw. When the end came it found the two men in the centre of the ring engaged in a terrible struggle. The whole upper part of their bodies was covered with blood. While Jeffries held up the gloves of both fighters a shout of disapproval went up from the Burns admirers who believed their man had won. Burns, who fought like a bull dog from the beginning to the end, was always on the aggressive, crowding his opponent to the ropes and mercilessly punning him about

practically from the first round to the last was terrific. Burns landed undoubtedly many more blows than his opponent and they seemed to show greater force. O'Brien's footwork, however, was fast and clever and his ducking saved him time and again from severe punishment.

After the fight last night Burns said: "I was weary and I think the decision was lost. I concede O'Brien may win the ring. Just compare our faces and draw your conclusions."

O'Brien said: "I am very well satisfied

with the decision. James and the fight thing. I expected Burns to win. But I like Little for him. Hereafter I shall fight in the middleweight class."

Referee Jeffries defending his decision, said:

Round Six.

Burns, with head down and eyes eager, continued to follow his man around the ring. O'Brien missed a straight left and Burns' right arm came up to block him to stand and fight. O'Brien trotted back and forth, punching occasionally. Burns landed a right to the head. Burns leading. The crowd displayed a great reaction and urged O'Brien to fight. Round Seven.
