clude 25 passengers, 20 European officers and 55 natives of the Aden's crew.

THE DETAILS TOLD.

A Monsoon struck the vessel and drove her on a hazardous reef.

London, June 30.—A despatch to The Daily Mail from Aden, Arabia, says: "Two days after leaving Colombo, the Aden was struck by a severe monsoon with squalls, violent and incessant."

"On June 9 the vessel struck upon the Rasmussen reef, on the eastern coast of the island of Socotra. It was soon seen that the steamer could not survive the shock and that the only chance for safety lay in the boats. Life belts were distributed, distress signals given, and the boats on the lee side prepared for launching. Those on the weather side had already been washed away."

Lifeboats Swept Away.

"A life boat was lowered, only to be swept away immediately with the lifeboats and the first officer, Mr. Carden. The gig was despatched to the rescue, with Mr. Miller, the second officer, in command, to the despair of all, both boats were rapidly swept away."

"The only remaining lifeboat was then lowered amid a scene of intense emotion. A cry of anguish broke from the lips even of the men, when this half-captain, throwing the anchors and the stores into the sea, and great efforts the boat was righted and the women and children were lowered into it, with the exception of Mesdames Gillett, Pearce and Slinn, who heroically decided to share the fate of their husbands and remained on board. The boat, manned by a European crew, left in a tempestuous sea and drifted rapidly out of sight."

Swept Away One by One.

"Fast waves still swept the wreck, and, one by one, men, women and children, grown too weak to withstand the repeated buffetings, were washed overboard in sight of those who were momentarily expecting the same fate."

"All day the victims were picked off one by one, until 5 o'clock in the afternoon, when those who still survived retreated below in suspense. Day after day the desperate men kept a shroud, but no vessel was sighted until the 13th, and even then the distress signal was not seen. On the 17th and on the 20th other vessels were sighted, but the signals either were not seen or were ignored."

"Three unhappy episodes caused painful and half crazy scenes of rage among those who had previously been controlled. Each day it was necessary to curtail the allowance of rations. Mrs. Gillett died the evening, and contributed greatly to cheering up the ship's company."

Rescue at Last.

"On June 25, when things were at almost exhausted, two steamers were sighted. One proceeded without paying any attention to the distress signal. The other anchored under the lee of the island. As soon as she was sighted a laser mounted the flag and signalled her. In reply candles burned at her port holes, and at day-break on the 27th a suspense of 17 days was ended by the spectacle of the steamer rounding the point and heading towards the wreck. She dropped anchor about a mile away. It took three-quarters of an hour for a lifeboat to reach the wreck. It was the lifeboat of the Indian Government steamer 'M. O.', and in charge of Lieutenants Doherty and Goldsmith. They skillfully avoided the tremendous wash and rescued all of the survivors in two trips."

THE HIGHLANDERS' RECEPTION.

Arrangements Under Way to Give the Brave Team a Rousing Welcome After the Jubilee Trip.

In the smoking room at the Queen's Hotel last night Mayor Fleming presided over a meeting of the committee to arrange for a reception to the successful team of the 48th Highlanders that won so much glory at the recent military tournament in England.

After several reception schemes had been discussed, it was decided to have the performance all in the evening. The team will arrive by train, and a parade for a grand procession will be given by the Union Station and proceed to Queen's Park, where speeches will be delivered, and an illuminated address will be presented to the men as a team, and each member of the team will be given a copy of the dress, signed by the Mayor, and a purse will be presented to the gallant representatives of the Highlanders.

The Executive Committee, which is a large one, will decide in the program throughout, also regarding means for the men, and will meet at a meeting to be held next Tuesday night.

TORNADO WEST OF LONDON.

Baras Blown Down, Trees Levelled and Crops Destroyed—Bugsy Captured and People Hurt.

Lambeth, June 29.—A terrific electric storm, accompanied by wind, struck this vicinity about 4.15 this afternoon. Mr. Nixon's barn was blown completely down and demolished. The roof was torn off another barn and a brick house was also blown down. Mr. Phoenix's bush is nearly destroyed, the trees being broken like straws. The storm crossed the Spring Creek, about two miles east of here. All grain in the open of the storm was blown down, and the telegraph poles broken. A great amount of damage was done, but so far as known only one accident happened. Mr. Berwickshire, in company with his mother, Mrs. Savor, and another lady, were driving along the road when the lady, caught them. The lady was blown over and the occupants were violently to the ground. Mrs. Savor is supposed to have received serious injuries, while the other two escaped with a good shaking up.

LAUGHTON CLUBBED SIFTON.

Walked Up the Aisle of a Methodist Church and Hit Him Over the Head—Sent for Trial.

Strathroy, Ont., June 29.—The preliminary hearing of Sanford Laughton of Metcalfe, on the charge of assault and doing bodily harm to Charles Sifton, a young farmer of the same township, came up before Judge MacIntyre yesterday. A week ago Sunday Sifton was attending the morning service in a Methodist Church in Metcalfe, when Laughton came in, walked up the aisle and struck him a severe blow with a club on the head, causing the blood to flow. A great deal of excitement was caused by the incident among the worshippers, and after the service was over Laughton was arrested. No cause is given for Laughton's action, except, it is said, he had the idea Sifton was interfering with his love affairs, as he had been saying marked attention to Sifton's sister, and was given to understand he was not wanted around. The prisoner was committed for trial. Bail was not accepted, but it is likely it will be granted by the judge. The parties are well known and much respect is given to the case by the community.
