#### ABOUT THE GRATUITY FUND.

Mr. R. H. Tomlinson Submits Some Facts and Fig. ures and Concludes That the Usefulness of the Scheme Has Been Destroyed,

I trespass upon your, space to lay before your readers, many of whom may not be in possession of all the facts relating to its organization, the true position of the scheme from its inception and leave them to from their own opinion of its usefulness or otherwise, and whether it has proved a failure or not? The principles upon which the scheme was founded are, briefly, as follows: Any member of the Board of Trade, at the time, regardless of age or physical condition, was eligible for membership and entitled to all the benefits of the gratuity fund, so long as he continued to pay his annual dues to the Board (\$10) and the mortunry assessments of \$3 for each death occurring in the membership. Out of these assessments the beneficiaries of the deceased members were to receive an aggregate sun equal to \$1 from each members, with an addition of \$100 for each year Ledeceased was a subscriber to the scheme the other \$2 to be set apart to form a reserve fund. The necessary legislation having been obtained, the bysisws giving effect thereto were adopted by the Board of Trade on June 29, 1889, and the subscription books opened. It will be seen that 107 deaths occurred, that \$146,259 has been paid over to 509 beneficiaries, and a surplus fund of \$103,462 accumulated, after paying expenses of management, amounting to \$12,605. day - Largest Funeral in Toronto for Several Years. The funeral of the late William Bell, exalternan and school trustee, which took
place from his late residence 16 Foxleystreet, yesterday afternoon, was one of the
largest funerals ever held in Toronto.
There were upwards of 100 carriages,, and
about 400 members of Orange Lodges on
