THE MILITARY TATTOO.

Five Thousand People Witnessed the Spectacular Entertainment at Hamilton's Point.

An enormous crowd witnessed the military tattoo at the island last night, and possibly 5000 people were present. The tattoo itself was a repetition of the previous ones, somewhat improved in detail and enhanced by a fireworks display. Its most inspiring feature was the marching past of the bands, each band playing its regimental air. Exclusive of drums and pipes there were eight brass bands. A company of flambeaux and torch bearers accompanied each band, and a picturesque effect was maintained throughout the entertainment. The bugle bands played remarkably well, and so did the pipes. Of the brass bands, the crowd, judging from the applause, favored the Highlanders, but every band was well received.

An impressive feature of the entertainment was the rendition of "Katie Brown" by the massed bands. The "Katie Brown" was the most appreciated feature of the program. The fireworks were nothing extraordinary, but were at the same time very pretty.

Owing to unfavorable wind conditions, there was no pyrotechnic balloon ascension, and many who had looked for this as the most unique part of the entertainment were disappointed. Manager Stewart's son, who was in the crowd, was very favorable to the illuminated balloon ascension.

The set piece of the night was very pretty, and created a sense of unity in the minds of the spectators. The bugle bands played the national air and the singing in the grand stand rendered the chorus.

There were the customary complaints from people who were in a hurry regarding the inadequacy of the ferry service to handle a crowd of the size that gathered on the island. The last boat of the big crowd was in town at midnight.

A military tattoo was an interesting entertainment. To present one it requires a small army of performers to produce what appears to be a simple but attractive program, particularly when every one is imbued with the military spirit, and their countrymen are piling up every in a hard war.

A MAN FROM 'WHITE HORSE'.

Government Engineer Tache Cleared Away Obstructions in the Yukon River.

Among the guests registered at the Ross House yesterday were J. C. Tache, Government engineer at White Horse, Yukon, his family, and assistant, Paul McRae, son of the late ex-governor of Quebec. Mr. Tache has been engaged for 10 months in clearing away obstructions in the Yukon River, so that it is now open for high draft boats the entire distance of 438 miles. Forty thousand dollars were expended in the work, and it was to obtain money for this purpose that Mr. Tache has been at Ottawa.

White Horse has doubled its population in a year, having a population now of 2000 persons. Copper is a staple ore, assays showing as high as 50 per cent. of the mineral to the ton. It is mined in 172 miles from Dawson, potatoes, cabbage, turnips and other vegetables can be grown profitably. FIREMEN ON THE CARPET.

Fire and Water Committee Duly Constituted as a Court—The Punishment Was Light.

BUSINESS OF SEWER COMMITTEE.

More Drains Are to Be Built—Toronto Junction C.P.R. Employees Had a Picnic—General News.

Hamilton, July 25.—(Special).—Some of the members of the Fire Department, instead of the chief of the Fire Department, was the proper party to try the accused, and consequently to-night the committee was called on to hear two charges. A. Kappeler of the Central station was charged by the firemen with insubordination and insolence. The charge was dropped.

Fireman John Wood was charged with a breach of the rules. One holiday he had taken a man and was fined by the magistrate. Some of the aldermen thought he had been punished enough. Dr. Williams spoke out for Wood and British justice. The committee considered a black mark and a reprimand was a fitting punishment.

The committee had a long wrestle with the request from the Firemen's Union that only one man be employed as teamster. Chairman Dixon wanted to have the matter over till next year, but he was supported.

Superintendent McAndrew told the committee some strange things about the drivers. Some of the men had had as many as six different drivers. Others again objected to working for their employers 24 hours a day. Some of these men, he assured the committee, worked in the field in the early morning, withered the streets for eight hours, then hauled manure and wound up their day's work by picking up the refuse of the city.

The question was finally left with the chairman and superintendent.

Various Requests Made.

The department employees asked for an increase of wages from 25 cents to 35 cents an hour. Ald. Dixon wanted the matter referred to the committee.

New Requests Made.

The committee asked for a raise to 25 cents a day, and the firemen asked for 35 cents an hour. At last the committee, on motion of Ald. Dixon, agreed to pay the firemen 25 cents a day, and the firemen would not be paid.

The men protested, but the committee wouldn't budge.

Inspectors Grant, O'Brien and Dunt asked to be appointed by by-law. The request was laid over.

New Men Arrived To-day.

The laying of the following new mains was agreed to: Six-inch on Robert-street, from Victoria to West-avenue, to cost \$500; Grant-avenue, from Main to King-street, to cost \$700.

The Sewers Committee.

The Sewers Committee is at least realistic in its attitude to the North end residents in the matter of sewer accommodation. At its meeting this evening Ald. Walker reported that the committee had decided to place on North Catherine-street regarding the flooding of their premises, and said that it was a grievance which should be remedied.

Ald. Findlay was of the same opinion, and thought the committee should give immediate relief.

Ald. Tenby asked the Finance Committee to have no funds and a trunk sewer could not be built on the local improvement plan.

For consideration of the committee, Ald. Reid and Chairman Macdonald were appointed a sub-committee to wait on the Finance Committee, and advise on the matter, and also to have plans prepared. The estimated cost of the sewer is \$10,000.

A large number of claims for damages for the flooding of cellars in the vicinity of North Catherine-street were referred to a sub-committee.

Regarding the tenders of Marshall Road, the committee decided to recommend 15 cents per cubic yard for the work.

FROM THE BITE OF A MOSQUITO.

Was Bitten by the Insect on July 7 and Blood-Poisoning Followed.—Was a Vice-President of the Industrial Exhibition—His Career.

Ex-Ald. Patrick G. Close, second vice-president of the Industrial Exhibition Association, passed away yesterday morning at his late residence, 253 Simcoe-street, in the death of Mr. Close this day one of its most respected citizens, who was widely known and exceedingly popular.

The cause of his death was blood poisoning, resulting from the bite of a mosquito. On Saturday, July 7, while out attending to his business, he received the bite from the little insect, and a few days later the wound became painful.

On Tuesday night he partly lost consciousness, but early yesterday morning seemed to recognize the members of his family, all of whom were at his bedside. Exactly at 7 o'clock he passed away.
