

BRITISH SHIP OWNERS WILL FIGHT MORGAN WITH MORGAN'S OWN ARTS

Three Hundred Separate English Companies Thinking Seriously Along That Line in Order to Forestall Any Further Shipping Consolidations by Americans.

London, May 10.—Big combinations of shipping designed to fight for the Atlantic carrying trade with Mr. J. P. Morgan's fleet have become the talk and hope of the British maritime world. Sir Christopher Furness, Mr. J. H. Elder and several other ship owners of equal prominence are giving close attention to the movements of Mr. Morgan and his allies, and intend to forestall, if possible, a series of steamship consolidations really dangerous to Great Britain's commercial position upon the high seas.

London shipping circles, comprising some 300 separate companies, all owning vessels, are discussing British plans to checkmate American activity, but decline to supply specific facts concerning what has been done or what is proposed.

The editor of the Shipping and Mercantile Gazette said today:

British ship-owners refuse to be either scared or manoeuvred off the ocean. They have been there a good while, their fair weather and foul, and they expect to remain indefinitely. They

realize the resourcefulness of their Yankee competitors, but there has never been a time when Britishers failed to enjoy a stiff fight. They welcome Mr. Morgan to the Atlantic. His presence there will add somewhat to the gaiety of nations. Doubtless, it will benefit the United States. It will not, however, I think, make a complete landlubber of John Bull. True, the latter gentleman is rather obese, and we understand that our tall, dashing friend Uncle Sam is taking on flesh; yet the Atlantic Ocean is large. It ought to be big enough for both of them.

Mr. Morgan doesn't alarm us, but he does make us curious and watchful. We intend to keep a lookout for him. Whenever his steamship enterprises get too big, that is to say, whenever they approximate the manifest of the late Captain Furness, we shall like Sir Christopher Furness will be found on the ground taking note of the maritime traditions of Great Britain.

When pressed for information as to whether British steamship combinations were under way, the shipping expert declared that the action of British ship-owners would be a large extent upon the action of Americans.

A WELL-GROUNDED PROTEST

Sir James Lemoiné Speaks Vigorously Against Proposed Montgomery Memorial.

DENIES THAT HE EVER FAVORED IT

Much Better, He Says, to Erect a Monument to Sir Guy Carleton.

Montreal, May 10.—(Special.)—Following is the energetic protest of Le Journal of this city:

Sir James Lemoiné is out against the proposal to erect a Montgomery memorial at Quebec. In the first place, he protests against the inference that he was ever in favor of it. He explains that in 1896 he defended the memory of Gen. Richard Montgomery because he considered that it had been unjustly ascribed by certain historians to confounding him with his elder brother, Alexander Montgomery, who was an officer of the 43rd Regiment, under Wolfe, at Quebec, and who, during the campaign of 1759, earned for himself the unenviable title of the "Canadian Ruler." By ordering defences French Canadian prisoners whom he considered to be shot. But he claims that he still holds the same opinion about Richard Montgomery, the invader of our soil, which he endeavored to convey in the resolutions unanimously carried by the Quebec Literary and Historical Society in 1898 in opposition to the proposal to erect a monument in his honor at the spot where he fell. Lastly, he calls attention to the fact that the Victorian Club of Boston are still waiting for the permission of the Boston Council to erect in a Boston cemetery a memorial tablet recording the names of the British soldiers who fell at Bunker's Hill, fighting for their king, buried in said cemetery. This permission was refused in 1898. And Sir James adds: "Would not our City Council be justified in waiting for the permission granted to the Massachusetts folks? Should a memorial tablet or monument be erected at Free de Ville, Quebec, in his humble estimation the most appropriate would be one to Sir Guy Carleton, the 'Saviour of Quebec.'"

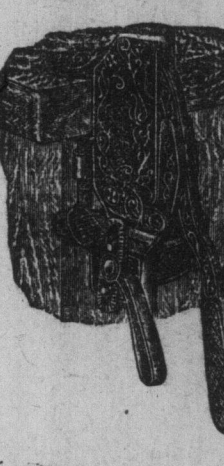

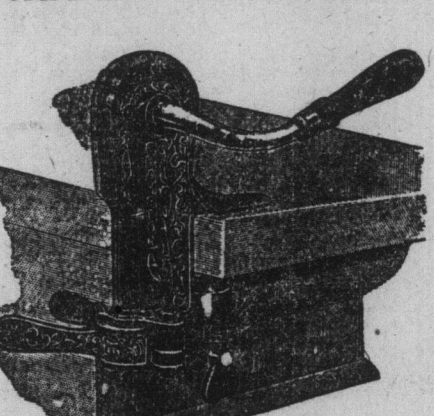
Shomee With Clamp.



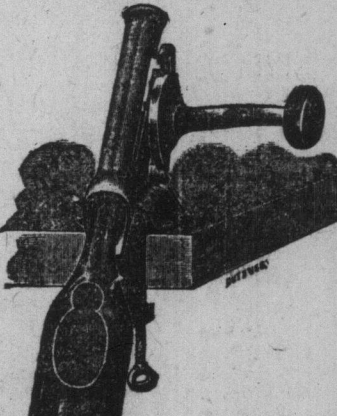

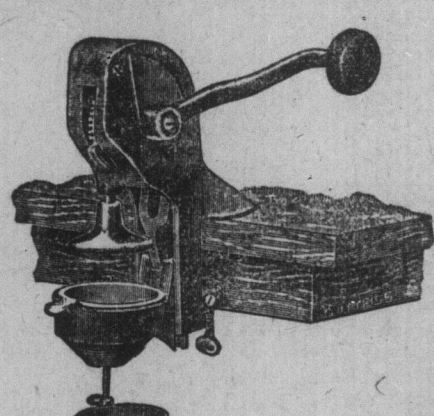
