



Buffalo to Toronto.

Buffalo, N.Y., May 10.—The International Rapid Transit Company, incorporated under the laws of the State of Delaware, has taken over the property and franchises of the International Ferry Company and Fort Erie Ferry Railway Company and will build a system of electric lines connecting Buffalo and Fort Erie with Crystal Beach, the Fort Erie Face track, Niagara Falls and Toronto. T. C. Fenyeer, general agent of the Westinghouse Electrical Manufacturing Company, is president of the new company. The new company, it is said, has secured the rights of way and the franchise from the Ontario Government for the construction of the new lines, and it was said yesterday that the work of building the lines would be begun in a few weeks.

Since penny postage came into vogue, there have been more complaints than formerly.
