

COUNTY WILL PAY 20 PER CENT OF COST OF PROOF LINE ROAD

Vote of 15 to 13 on Motion—Council Agree to the Tuberculosis Hospital Agreement.

At the morning session of the county council it was decided by a vote of 15 to 13 to grant London Township 20 per cent of the cost of the Proof Line Road. The motion was strongly opposed by Councillors Ronald, McGregor and Knapton. The councillors voted as follows: For the motion—Glass, Kimball, Ryan, Hawkshaw, Heath, Rush, Gillies, Hunter, Smith, McFarlane, Hodgins, Beattie, Brown, Tohill, D. Graham, Agathis, Robson, Elans, Knapton, McGregor, Ronald, Hill, McEwen, Brodie, Oakes, Timbrell, Sullivan, McTaggart and N. Graham.

The Tuberculosis Hospital. Ald. Stevely and Stevenson, of the city council finance committee, were in attendance at the council's invitation to confer on the tuberculosis hospital. Ald. Stevely pointed out that the city was not trying to push anything onto the county council. The latter body had, in fact, made overtures in regard to the matter to the city. But if the county was willing to pay the cost of the hospital, and of the uncontrollable expenditure, the county to pay the other two-fifths.

After a brief conference, during which the visitors explained the situation exactly to the council, it was moved by Councillor Glass, seconded by Councillor Kimball, that the report of the special committee on tuberculosis hospital and the proposed agreement between the city and county councils contained therein, form a satisfactory basis for further negotiations, and that the council accept the same, subject to a further satisfactory agreement being made between the city and county as to the management of the institution, the completion of which is to be referred back to the special committee, to report at the December session.

By this agreement the city is to pay 60 per cent and the county 40 per cent of the uncontrollable expenditure, each municipality to pay for its own patients over and above the grant from the Ontario Government.

It was recommended by the house of refuge committee in its second report that Albert Hughes, the neurasthenic patient now at Victoria Hospital at the county's expense, be removed to the house of refuge until he is able to perform light labor. Accounts totaling \$881 were also recommended.

The second report of the finance committee was a most important one, inasmuch as it contained facts and figures of vital interest to every taxpayer.

In the county. Under the reconsidered estimates the amount to be expended is \$44,862, instead of \$71,729 84, as was first understood.

A number of accounts were recommended paid, and figures showing the approximate amount to be paid by each municipality for the whole of Middlesex and Middlesex proper presented as follows:

Tuberculosis Meeting.

Mrs. T. C. Duncan, of this city, addressed the council briefly on the subject of tuberculosis, and invited the ladies of Middlesex County to be present at a meeting to be held in the city hall on June 19 at 2 p.m. to discuss "Home methods in relation to the prevention and cure of tuberculosis."

The proposed tuberculosis hospital will also be discussed. Mrs. Duncan stated that consumption in a mild form can often be readily treated at home, and that every woman in the county owed it to herself and family to be present at the meeting.

Bylaws. On a motion by Councillors Glass and Hunter it was voted that the clerk be instructed to secure from the clerks of the various municipalities two copies respectively of their bylaws and to have same bound; one copy to be for the use of magistrates, and to be left in the office of the crown attorney, the other to be retained in the office of the county clerk.

Just previous to adjourning, bylaws 597, 598, 599 and 600 received their third readings.

The council then adjourned until the second day of December.

OFFENSIVE CARDS PASS THROUGH MAILS

Move Against Them in Toronto, But Nothing Here.

A Toronto dispatch says: "The attention of the morality department of the Methodist Church has been called to the character of picture postal cards offered for sale to the public. Some of these are, to say the least, very suggestive, and some are pronounced positively indecent. From samples shown the picture complained of is protected by a cover which shields from the eye of postal authorities."

"P. C. Chapman, who is acting for Inspector Stevens, of the morality department of the city, has taken the matter up and prosecutions may be expected. The postal authorities state that where anything of a questionable character is sent on postal cards through the mails it is destroyed. It is a different matter when immoral pictures are sealed in envelopes, because there is a secrecy surrounding the British mails that is regarded as sacred by the postal department, but when immoral literature of any kind is sent in other ways and the letters are undisturbed, the postal authorities become very much annoyed. The postal cards objected to show women in scanty attire and in unbecoming postures."

It is said that post cards of the racy type are very difficult to procure in London, but a recent report that cards pass through the mails which are a positive disgrace.

European post cards are by far the most suggestive, but there are numerous samples of the Canadian article which might be well placed under the ban.

So far as known there is no move being made in this city against the cards, but there are numerous people who will lend assistance to any attempt which may be made to bar them from Canada.

TRIP TO IRELAND FOR KING EDWARD

With Queen Alexandra Will Visit Emerald Isle Early in July

London, June 7.—Coming on the heels of the widely-published stories of disaffection in certain districts of Ireland, alleged to be more serious than in any other period of the last 20 years, and provoking debates in both houses of Parliament, the sudden announcement is made that King Edward and Queen Alexandra will visit Ireland early in July. Their majesties will cross in the royal yacht and remain several days.

The news has caused great surprise, which is all the greater because recently it was given out that while the King would make the round of private visits to friends in Ireland, he would pay no official state visit this year.

Because of his consideration for the slender purse of Lord Aberdeen, the viceroys. The cost of entertaining the court on a state visit would be somewhat less than \$75,000, a greater outlay than the King's State visit to Lord Aberdeen in 1904.

The viceroys' comparative poverty is so notorious that it gave rise to a rumor that he was about to resign to accept the presidency of an insurance company.

It is entirely possible that the King considers that a state visit to the island would be so desirable at this time as to justify him in making up to Lord Aberdeen in some way the big expense of the entertainment.

It is significant that the King's visits to Ireland are invariably made during the time of disaffection. He is, however, always received with the greatest enthusiasm. The King having mentioned that he would like to visit a race meeting, the stewards of the Irish Turf Club have been requested to arrange a special for July 11 at Leopardstown, the beautiful course overlooking the sea near Dublin. It is understood that his majesty will present two cups on that occasion.

STOCK MARKETS.

H. C. Beecher, stockbroker, received the following by private wire from Bartlett, Frazier & Carrington today:

New York, June 8.—Close.—The effect this morning of that indefinable condition called an improvement in sentiment, whereby all events are interpreted in its favor, was as follows: The market opened with a light as possible, was seen in our stock market prices continued to advance, and at about the close of the day, 2 1/2 in Pennsylvania to 2 1/2 in Great Britain, and generally over a point in the net over last night's closing.
