A BLIZZARD IN BRITAIN

Three Men Perish in the Snow
in the Highlands.

Train Blown Off the Rails and
Many Lives Lost.

Queen Victoria Shows Her Regard for
Mrs. Gladstone-Luxurious Cer-
emony at the Christening of a Marl-
borough Baby-Interesting Soudan
Trophies.

[Special Cable Letter to The Adver-
tiser.]

London, Nov. 26.—The recent com-
paratively mild weather, which has
prevailed in Great Britain has been in-
terrupted by a thorough blizzard in
many parts of the country, especially
in the north, where the snowdrifts are
several feet deep. Three men perished
in the snow in the highlands, a train
was blown off the rails near Tralee, Ire-
land; numbers of fishing boats have
been lost. Many fishermen have per-
ished, and the Irish mail boats and
cross channel mail services were inter-
rupted or seriously delayed. The Bel-
fast mail boat was 20 hours in making
a trip which is usually accomplished in
six hours. Trains have been slowed up
at several places, and generally the
snowstorm is considered to have been
THE WORST FOR MANY YEARS.
The severe weather reached as far

south as the Mediterranean, where a
French transport bound for Tunis was
obliged to return to Toulon in a damag-
ed condition. She also reported that
some of the recruits on board of her
were killed or injured during the storm.
Queen Victoria is taking keen inter-
est just now in the progress of the
scheme for connecting Cape Town with
Cairo. She conversed with General
Lord Kitchener during his recent visit
to her Majesty, and she expressed the
hope of living to see it carried through.

THE QUEEN'S REGARD FOR MRS.
GLADSTONE.

The dislike of the Queen for the late
William E. Gladstone was well known,
but since the death of the great states-
man her Majesty has given several
proofs of her kindly regard for Mrs.
Gladstone, the widow. She has written
frequently to the latter, inquiring very
compassionately regarding her health,
and expressing the hope that her be-
reavement has now lost its keenness.
Mrs. Gladstone has been greatly touch-
ed by the tenderness and sympathy
which marked these epistles. Her
health has improved during the last
few weeks.

THE ANGLOPHOBIC FEELING IN
FRANCE.

There is some discussion this week
as to whether the Queen will again go
to the south of France next spring, in
view of the Anglophobic feeling excited
by the Fashoda dispute. An article by
M. Paul de Cassagnac in the *Autorite*
has especially given offense here. He
declared that the visit of the Queen
to Cannes would be an insult, and he
expressed the hope that her Majesty
would have more tact than to provoke
a demonstration of ill-feeling by her
presence on French territory at the
present moment, when, he adds, Great
Britain is doing her best to humiliate

France. These outbursts upon the part
of the French newspapers are having a
certain effect, and letters are having a
in the English papers urging that pres-
sure be exercised in the proper quar-
ters to induce the Queen not to go to
the French Riviera, but to go to Flor-
ence instead.

LUXURIOUS CEREMONY.

The christening of the second son of
the Duke and Duchess of Marlborough
at the Chapel Royal, St. James Palace,
on Monday last, was quite a luxurious
ceremony. Everything which was not
silk was lace, and mostly priceless too.
The front of the infant's satin robe
was covered with rare point d'Alecon
specially made at Venice, and an exact
fac-simile of a piece made for the
Queen of Italy. The Duchess of Marl-
borough has returned to Blenheim to
prepare for a large shooting party
which has been invited for the Christ-
mas holidays.

The Duchess of Marlborough is giv-
ing Alma Tadema sittings for a glass
portrait, similar to her mother's. The
portrait represents the duchess in the
costume and splendid jewels which she
wore upon the occasion of her presen-
tation at court.

MISERY AMONG WOUNDED SPAN-
ISH SOLDIERS.

The Countess Casa Valencia, wife of
the former Spanish ambassador of that
name, has written to the newspapers,
appealing for further funds to be de-
voted to the relief of the wounded
Spanish soldiers and widows of the
slain. As generous contributions al-
ready received will not suffice to meet
the widespread misery existing among
this class of unfortunate Spaniards, a
three days' bazaar will be opened at
Downspire House, on Dec. 1, by the In-
fantia Eulalia. The proceeds will be de-
voted to the Spanish fund for the re-
lief of the wounded and widows.

SOUDAN TROPHIES.

An interesting exhibition of Soudan
trophies has been opened at the United
Service Institution, Whitehall. The
khalf's black banner and the Der-
vishes' dark green banner, captured at
Omdurman, are conspicuous features
among the spears, swords, coats of
arms, and other bloodstained relics.
General Lord Kitchener, at a rep-
resentative meeting of city merchants
and bankers has explained the propos-
als for a London memorial college at
Khartoum, and read a letter from the
Marquis of Salisbury, advocating the
project. The meeting resolved to take
immediate steps to carry out the pro-
ject.

GEN. KITCHENER AT CAMBRIDGE.

At Cambridge, on Thursday last, Gen.
Kitchener was accorded a great recep-
tion, when he received the freedom of
the borough and was admitted to the
degree of doctor of laws, which was the
occasion for an outburst of time-hon-
ored, rollicking, undergraduate spirit.
The students mustered in great force at
the senate house, sang patriotic ditties
and dangled a life-size effigy of a der-
viser over the balcony in front of the
general, who, with the university "big-
chaff," later the students celebrated
the day with an enormous bonfire in
front of Market Hall, the fire being
renewed with garden fences, trades-

men's shutters and a newly-erected
municipal band-stand.

COSTLY NEWS.

Mr. Alfred Harmsworth, presiding at
a meeting of the shareholders of his
afternoon newspaper, the *Evening*
News, made some interesting remarks
on the Spanish-American war and
journalism. He said: "The American
war did not prove a source of revenue
to the newspapers. War correspondence
from Cuba cost the *Evening News*
£300, and the results have not paid the
bare expenses. The first week the
sales bounded up an extra 100,000 copies
per day. The second week they fell off
heavily, and the third week they re-
turned to their normal figure. The
smashing of the fleet off Santiago fail-
ed to move the circulation by a single
copy. The fact is, that the English
people never regarded the contest as a
serious affair. They could not conceive
it possible that folk of the same name
and the same blood as ourselves could
disgrace our race by suffering defeat
at the hands of a Latin people."
