GOVERNMENT ORGAN SAYS NO PROSPECT OF COALITION

LITTLE PROSPECT OF COALITION IN DOMINION CABINET

Ottawa Journal-Press, "In The Know," Declares Change Is Not Necessary—More Rumors of Cabinet Shifts.

Toronto, May 28.—There appears today no prospect of a coalition Government to handle the conscription problem. Any hopes held by coalitionists were dissipated this morning by an editorial in the Ottawa Journal-Press, whose president, F. D. Ross, is conceded to be a strong confidante of Sir Robert Borden, and probably more "in the know" than the Borden cabinet itself.

The Journal-Press said today: "The Borden Government needs no coalition with the spirit that has prevailed among Liberal politicians. It stakes itself upon conscription."

The Journal-Press refers to the anti-conscription remarks of Quebec Liberals, and says: "We prefer the present straight goods."

Among names mentioned this morning of cabinet members who may retire or be given public appointments to permit reconstruction are Messrs. Cochrane, Roche, Hazen, Burrell and Crothers. Names of probable new comers to the cabinet prominently mentioned today are Sir Adam Beck, Sir Henry Drayton, Z. A. Lash, K. C., J. W. Flavelle and Gideon Robertson, the labor senator.

'ADVANCE' IS MESSAGE OF RUSSIAN LEADERS TO THE MEN OF FORCE

Now Is Time To Strike To Help the Allies.

FREEDOM MAY BE LOST

Muscovite Commanders Call Upon Soldiers To Resume the Offensive.

Petrograd, May 27.—Via London, May 28.—Virtually all the divergent political factions, the Socialists, the Communists, and even the Socialist leaders, with the exception of the extreme left, today echo the appeal of Minister of War Kerensky to the troops and applaud the new order of the day, "Advance." It remains to be seen how the army will receive this final exhortation to patriotism and the defence of Russia's newly won freedom.

Constant efforts have been made during the past two months by representatives not only of the Government, but of the soldiers, to bring home to the army the fact that the abandonment of active warfare would not only mean treachery to the Allies, but the inevitable loss of all that has been gained in the revolution. It is confidently believed that this last call, supported as it is by almost every element of society, will move the army to a realization of its duty.

The commanders have added their appeals to the order of Minister Kerensky. They all emphasize the necessity of not only defending the country against the enemy, but of an immediate advance to the westward. "Forward," says the order, "is the only way to the westward."

Alexisef's Warning.
General Alexisef says tersely: "Forward. Advance to attack the enemy."

General Brusiloff says: "It is necessary to conserve and consolidate freedom. The soldiers must overthrow and defend the enemy. It is an honor to those who have a weak spirit."

General Dragomiroff is less laconic. "An advance upon the enemy," he says, "is an immediate necessity. The enemy is taking advantage of our passivity to leave this front open and send forces westward."

The French and British are honestly doing their duty as our allies. They are saving our new freedom, which otherwise we would lose. But soon their advance must wear itself out, and then there will be no one to help us."

The newspapers contain similar appeals from the heads of the Government. Premier Lloyd George, "Honour demands our activity. We are drawn in speeches and actions to the front. Our organization are being stretched. Further passivity will mean ruin." Mr. Stedman, the Socialist minister of labor, joins the chorus with the declaration: "Our present task is to advance."

In a new order to the army, Gen. Alexisef explained yesterday why it is impossible for the soldiers to recede. "The German lines are seeking peace conferences. Even the commander-in-chief," he says, "is prohibited by law from receiving peace delegates, and every man from the commander down to the private soldier is appeal to your intelligence and your heart. If the enemy really wanted peace he would know how to go about it. Wake up! Peace will be reached through victory. Trust your commanders."

OPERATORS ASK GOVT. TO OPERATE MINES

Declare They Have Made Fair and Reasonable Offer to Men.

Petrie, B. C., May 27.—As was anticipated, the result of the meeting of the Western Coal Operators' Association here yesterday resulted in a definite announcement on terms approved by the operators of their decision reached on May 8, and has been forwarded to Hon. A. Crothers, minister of labor, as follows:

"The Operators' Association have considered your communication of May 22 received through Fair-Wage Officer Harris. The association has settled an agreement on terms approved by the representatives of the men and of the president of the International Union as fair and reasonable, and we are ready to resume operations at any time on the basis of the agreement. It is the men will not accept what their own representatives and the representatives of the president of the International Union have said is fair and reasonable, we urge that the Government immediately take effective action to put the mines in operation."

SASKATCHEWAN VOTES TOWARDS END OF JUNE

SOCIAL DEMOCRATS OPPOSE CONSCRIPTION

Toronto, May 28.—At a meeting of the Social Democrats last night, when speeches were delivered in seven languages, resolutions were passed opposing any attempt to enforce military service on the people. The speakers called upon the government to eliminate gambling, to provide employment for the unemployed, to provide food and fuel for the poor, and to provide for the education of the children. The resolutions were adopted by a large majority.

GERMAN DEFENCES CRUMBLING UNDER THE CANADIAN FIRE IN FIGHTING ALONG SCARPE

Canadian Army Headquarters, May 28.—Rumor has it that the Kaiser recently visited Douai, and addressing a gathering of officers and men, he said: "The German line is crumbling. The Scarpe-Lens line, announced that the British offensive in the region of the Scarpe, was of an entirely new kind. It is a good talker, but had his officers taken him out to Avion, Mericourt, and Achille, and other points east of Vimy, where the German defences are crumbling under the steady fire of our lines and some prisoners of the Fifth Prussian Footguards."

VAST CROWD AT MADRID CHEERS ENTENTE ALLIES

Twenty-Five Thousand Express Sympathy For Britain and Allies

AT THE SPANISH CAPITAL

Authorities Refuse To Permit Pro-Germans To Hold Demonstration.

Madrid, May 27.—Via Paris, May 28.—The long expected gathering of the elements in Madrid favorable to the Entente Allies was held this morning at the Plaza de Turia. There was great enthusiasm among the people, who were estimated to number 25,000. A counter demonstration by Germanophiles was forbidden by the authorities in order to prevent possible disturbances.

Conspicuous among the decorations of the great hall ring were the names of thirty-six torpedoes Spanish vessels in huge letters. The speakers included all the leaders of the progressive party in Spain.

Miguel Unamuno, former rector of Salamanca University, provoked thunderous applause, when he declared that the liberal objects of the Allies in the war were demonstrated by the entry into it of the "great American democracy."

The meeting concluded after the adoption of a resolution asking the premier to make public a declaration of Spanish sympathy with the Allies. Some disturbances were caused by Germanophiles as the crowd was dissolving. A man in the crowd fired at Alejandro Llorca, Republican deputy, without hitting him. The police arrested a number of the demonstrators.

BORDEN AND LAURIER HOLD CONFERENCE ON COMPULSORY SERVICE

Ottawa, May 28.—There have been informal conferences upon the situation created by Premier Borden's declaration of compulsory service. Sir Robert Borden and Sir Wilfrid Laurier have been in conference with the chief of the Right Hon. Mr. Balfour, who addresses Parliament this afternoon. It is understood that they took advantage of the opportunity to discuss the situation of the country, and which can be carried through without repetition of the incidents already seen in Montreal and Quebec.

NINE SIX-INCH GUNS TAKEN BY ITALIANS

MONTREAL MAY BE PLACED UNDER MARTIAL LAW, SAYS PAPER, BUT WILSON DENIES

Le Canada Declares General Wilson Has Been Given Power To Establish Military Rule If Necessary—Soldiers Invade East End, Seeking Attackers of Wounded Men.

Ottawa, May 28.—General Wilson, officer commanding this military district, denied this afternoon the claim made in a French paper this morning, that he had received instructions to introduce martial law here should he deem it necessary.

Montreal, May 28.—The district of Montreal may be put under martial law, according to Le Canada, which says it has learned General Wilson, officer commanding this military district, has been given instructions to establish military rule here should he deem it necessary.

Last night a Socialist speaker, addressing a large meeting at St. James' Market, advised people to refuse to register if conscription was introduced.

ENEMY REPULSED BY THE FRENCH IN NIGHT FIGHT

Heavy Assaults Were Thrown Back at Three Points.

NEW BATTLE AT VERDUN

Germans Bombarding Heavily French Positions in Dead Man Hill Region.

Paris, May 28.—Noon.—The Germans delivered three attacks last night and this morning in the Champagne, in the regions of Casque, the Teton and Mont Blanc. All were repulsed, the war office announces.

The Germans are bombarding heavily French positions in the regions of Verdun, the Hill and Hill 304, on the Verdun front.

A French detachment penetrated to the second German line near Uffholtz, and found many dead in the trenches.

THE FRENCH REPORT

The French statement follows: "In the Champagne during the night the enemy twice renewed his attacks against the Casque and the Teton. He was repulsed completely. A third effort made this morning against Mont Blanc, was no more successful, being checked by our fire."

"On the Verdun front in the region of Hill 304 and Dead Man Hill, the enemy's artillery is very active."

"In Alsace, in the vicinity of Uffholtz, one of our detachments penetrated as far as the second German line, observing the presence of numerous dead in the trenches. The enemy is bringing back prisoners. There is nothing to report from the remainder of the front."

There was very great aerial activity yesterday and last night. Enemy airplanes dropped bombs in the regions of Baccarat, Nancy and Pont St. Vincent, causing no important damage. Our squadrons made numerous sorties, in the course of which they threw down nearly 7,000 kilograms (15,400 pounds) of projectiles on the enemy's positions.
