Mr. and Mrs. Hotham, residing near ing if the house was carried away. They crawled down over the roof and marooned on their housetop by the Mrs. Hotham got part way marooned on their housetop by the Thames flooding its banks today, and were rescued with greatest difficulty. A call for help was sent to London. Four firemen and two boats were sent out by a special G. T. R. train to rescue them.

The water surrounding the home is said to be ten feet deep. From Komoka it was learned late this afternoon that the rising of the river had gradually carried the lock from the river close to the house. Power Consumers and Others Will Be Cared For by Company, City or Power Controller, Declares Utilities Man ager.



Gen. Hoffmann, accord to a Russian official statement given out today, says that the authentication must be sent to the German command at Dvinsk. The Russian official statement says that a messenger from Petro grad is being sent to Dvinsk today with the original peace message which was signed by Premier Lenine and Foreign Minister Trotzky.
