GREEK MET GREEK AND FIGHT ENSUED

But One Has to Pay \$10 for Assault.

That the saying "when Greek meets Greek then comes the tug of war" has still some excuse for its existence was in some degree borne out in the city police court today, when Sam Pangaras and Peter Poppas were charged before Police Magistrate Graydon with assault on a fellow-countryman named James Annis. The alleged assault took place at the corner of Richmond and Pallaton streets about 5:15 on the night of December 5.

Annis told of having paid a visit to his brother's store near the Grand Opera House and stated that he was returning home when Pangaras and Poppas sprang on him from the shadows at the corner of Pallaton street. He said that Poppas first of all swore at him in Greek and then hit him in the left eye twice and knocked him down. Pangaras, he claimed, held him while Poppas hit him. He thought Poppas had something in his hand, but could not tell what it was. When he got up off the ground he tried to strike back, but finding he could not do this, he ran back to his brother's store. He admitted that he and Poppas quarreled.

Before the Marks.

The brother who he bore and

the scar below it were caused by the blows struck by Poppas. James Annis told of seeing Annis return to his brother's store a short time after he left it. His left eye was black and he was bleeding from a cut under it.

Sam Pangaras, sworn, declared that he took no part in the assault beyond that of peace maker. The trouble, he declared, was started by Annis spitting in Poppas' face. They were not waiting in hiding for Annis. He was positive that Poppas did not hit Annis till after the latter spit in his face. The two men clinched and he separated them. Annis, he claimed, hit Poppas during the melee and then ran away. Peter Poppas was coming down town to get a cup of coffee when he met Pangaras and while standing talking to him Annis came up. Witness remarked to Pangaras, "look who's here," and Annis spit in his face. He admitted striking Annis, but claimed that Annis also hit him and caused the scratches, which he exhibited to the court.

Asked Dismissal.

W. G. Fitzgerald, appearing for the defendants, submitted that there was no evidence of assault on the part of Pangaras, and that in the case of Poppas he had only done what any other man would have done when another man spat in his face.

W. G. R. Barram, for the complainant, claimed that the charge of assault had been proven and asked for conviction.

Magistrate Graydon dismissed the charge against Pangaras, but found Poppas guilty of the assault and imposed a fine of \$10 and costs.

VOTE ON PURCHASE OF STREET RAILWAY POSSIBLE ANY TIME

Ald. E. S. Little Points Out the Way.

WOULD BE DIFFERENCE

If Not Taken in January Line Would Come Under Hydro Commission.

It will be quite possible to take a vote on the purchase of the street railway at any time, Ald. E. S. Little stated today. Amendment has been made to the municipal act, so that voting for municipal ownership must take place at the regular time appointed for election. However, it is possible to take a vote for any time, he said, during the year, the only difference being that the road would then come under the hydro-electric commission and not directly under that of the city.

This was the case in Windsor, where a vote was taken only last Saturday. This being the case, Ald. Little points out that a vote can be taken immediately on a complete report being received from the hydro electric valuation.

Ald. Little is strongly in favor of letting the people decide the issue. At the special city council on Saturday night, when it was decided not to submit a vote on the matter at this election, he held out against this policy and moved that the matter be sent to the electors. This was defeated, however.

OVER \$4,000 GIVEN TO C. A. S. CAMPAIGN

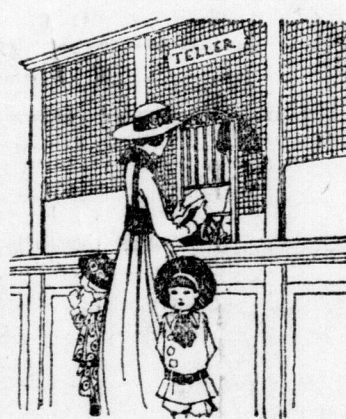
