"I am sure I shall drop dead," cried Betty at last. "I haven't run so far for years and my breath is giving out."

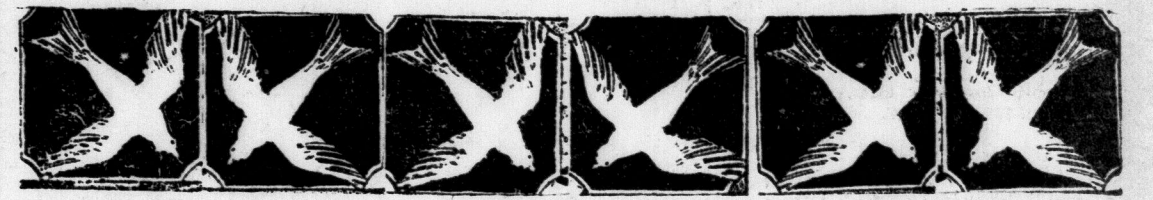
"Just a little farther," panted Pete, "just a little farther."
