Warsaw, July 29.—By the Associated Press.—Additional French officers at-tached to the military mission have ar-rived. All of them will be assigned to various Polish units as technical advisers. A large officers' school, under the supervision of French officers was opened today at Rembertoff, a suburb of Warsaw. of Warsaw.


