Nearly Half Million Is Authorized For Operations in Canada.

METHODIST CHURCH

TO SPEND \$1,312,000

ON MISSION WORK

Toronto, Oct. 8.-The authorization of appropriations totalling \$1,312,000 for exnditure on missions during the coming year was the outstanding feature of today's sessions of the general board of missions of the Methodist Church.

Of this amount, \$23,000 goes to the Women's Missionary Society; \$130,000 for administration, education and miscellaneous; \$706,000 for the foreign missions and \$452,000 for home missions. The last mentioned amount may be slightly reduced, as the figures are to be revised tomorrow by the board. Last year's total expenditure was \$1,043,000. In addition to the above amounts, \$547,000 from the Forward Movement campaign was either appropriated or placed in the hands of the local subcommittee for appropriation on property to the home and foreign fields.

Rev. Dr. W. J. Sipprell, Victoria, was appointed superintendent of missions for British Columbia, to take the place of Dr. J. H. White, who will retire shortly. ng year was the outstanding feature of

A committee was appointed to interview a committee of the Federal Parliament to ask for an increase in the Government grants to the institutions devoted to the education of the Indian population of Canada.

At the morning session it was decided to transfer the department of Indian missions from the foreign to the home department. This step was taken in the hope that it would stimulate the Indians to a greater interest in their self-support.
