SPOKANE. Wash. Oct. 14.—More than 1,000,000 fruit trees will be planted in the Yakima Valley, in Central Washington, west of Spokane, this fall and next spring, according to estimates made by expert horticulturists. Including the trees planted during the season just closed this will give the valley 5,339,400 trees, of which upward of 1,000,000 were set out this year. F. A. Huntley, state commissioner of horof 1,000,000 were set out this year. F. A. Huntley, state commissioner of horticulture, shows in his report that Ya-kima County had 1,955,692 apple trees, 167,960 peach trees, 571,882 pear trees, 167,960 cherry trees and 27,262 plum and prune trees, or 3,399,402 of a total of 11,212,511 trees reported in the state at the close of 1908.
