COAL CONTRACTS STAND SAYS ONE AUTHORITY

Prices Set By Washington Govern-
ment Will Not Affect
Sales Now Made.

"All existing coal contracts stand, ac-
cording to the ruling of the president,"
said a large Buffalo coal shipper to a
reporter for The World yesterday when
asked if the price fixed by the presi-
dent made void all existing contracts.
Yesterday the Buffalo dealers were
advised that coal shipments would be
considered in the following order:
First, coal for water shipment; second,
railway fuel, and third, commercial
coal. This would alter the relative order
for the next month or six weeks, and
after that there would be a wild scramble
for commercial coal.

There was little coal for sale in Buf-
falo yesterday, all that was "running"
being delivered on existing contracts
and it was absolutely impossible to
place an order for bituminous coal. At
the two dollar price that was fixed by
the government last week.

"Any concern that has its winter coal
in its hands is going into Canada,
but I will give you a hundred dollars
if you can get a car of two dollar
coal," concluded the Buffalo coal man.

NO RETAIL SALE OF CANNED GOODS

Copy of Order-in-Council
Placing Embargo Ar-
rives Here.

LAW IN FORCE

Offenders Against Regula- tions Liable to Meet With Punishment.

A copy of the order-in-council re-
garding the embargo on canned vege-
tables arrived in Toronto yesterday.
It is dated August 24, and reads as
follows:

"On and after the twenty-fourth
day of August, 1917, and until fur-
ther notice except as hereinafter
provided, the sale and purchase of
peas, beans, tomatoes, beets, celery,
corn, spinach, rhubarb and pump-
kins preserved in cans, glass jars or
any other receptacles, commonly
known as 'canned vegetables,' is pro-
hibited.

"(a) The above regulations shall not
apply:
(1) to such vegetables as are sold
by the manufacturer to the whole-
saler, jobber or retailer; or by the
wholesaler or jobber to the retailer; or
(2) When such vegetables are to be
consumed in lumber camps, min-
ing camps, construction camps, and
other camps, provided that they will
be consumed within said lumber
camps, mining camps, construction
camps and dining cars, and not re-
sold.

"(b) When such vegetables form a
part of the contents of a can, glass
jar, bottle or other container, and are
sold as soups, catsup or pickles.
"It is provided, however, that the
food controller for Canada may issue
licenses permitting the sale and con-
sumption of said 'canned vegetables'
in such cases as he deems necessary
or expedient."

SECOND INSTALLMENT OF 1917 TAXES.

1. Ratepayers are reminded that
Wednesday, August 29th, will be the
last day to make payment of the second
instalment of taxes without penalty.
By paying your second and third in-
stalments together at the present time
a discount is allowed on the third in-
stalment.
2. By making payment now tax-
payers avoid the rush on the last day,
29th of August, and the possibility of
entirely overlooking payment.
3. If payment is made by cheque, the
cheque must be "marked" by the bank,
has a stamp affixed and be payable
at par in Toronto, to order of the
"City Treasurer."
4. If payment is made in cash, the
exact amount of change should be
tendered; this will prevent delay.
5. Receipts for taxes sent by mail
will be forwarded as speedily as pos-
sible if stamped and addressed "return
envelope" accompanies remittance.

GERMANS TO SPARE ARGENTINE SHIPS

Berlin Government Adopts
Conciliatory Attitude To-
wards Latin Republic.

Buenos Aires, Aug. 28.—Germany's
reply to Argentina's note embodying
demands in connection with the sub-
marine campaign as affecting Argen-
tine shipping has been received. In
official circles it was stated that the
reply was satisfactory.

According to the newspaper, La
Razon, the German note meets all the
demands of Argentina.

The note says that Germany, "in
order to maintain friendly relations
with Argentina, is willing to modify
her blockade of enemy coasts, allow-
ing freedom of the seas to vessels
under the Argentine flag carrying food."

The note also promises the pay-
ment of an indemnity for the sink-
ing of the Argentine steamer, Toro,
by a German submarine.

CONVENTIONS TO SWELL CROWDS AT EXHIBITION

Large Numbers of Out-of-Town
Arrivals Registering at
City Hotels.

Attendance at the Canadian National
Exhibition will be swelled this year by
the attendance of delegates who will be
present at two conventions which will be
held in Toronto in the next two weeks.
The first of these is the tenth annual
two-day meeting of the Canadian Gas
Association, registration for which opened
at the booth in the King Edward Hotel
last night. The other is the convention
of the Independent Order of Foresters,
to be held here Sept. 10. John H. Laughton
of London, Ont., high chief ranger of the
Foresters, has reserved quarters at the
Hotel Marlborough for himself and other offi-
cials of the lodge.
Many spectators who would not other-
wise, perhaps, attend the Exhibition have
arrived to be present at the international
trapezoidal tournament. This event pro-
mises to be one of the most interesting in
connection with the national fair, the
prominence and records of the competi-
tors in the shoot making it an extraordi-
nary attraction.
