Coroner's Jury Believes Wallace Goodfellow Would Have Recovered With Proper Treatment-Issuing of Death Certificate Also Criticized.

The verdict returned by Coroner Cotton's jury after midnight came after hearing the evidence of Dr. Carveth, who was severely criticized by the coroner for his ready, issuing of a death certificate; Drs. Caven and Johnston, who conducted the post-mortem examination, and Mrs. Goodfellow, mother of the deceased. The jury was composed of: Edwin Ludford (fore-Salmon, Harry Ellis, George Hall, Fred Hall, Charles Brock, Fred Atwood, Thomas Taylor and Fred Holland. Crown Attorney Drayton stated that no warrants would be issued on the persons named in the finding and police court proceedings will fol-

Carveth argued that he knew the case was in the hands of the coroner when he issued the certificate. Dr. Cotton thought this was hardly possible, as he got his information from Mrs. Taylor before the young man died, and, in any event, knowing that it was in the coroner's hand, he should not have issued the certificate.

Gave Wrong Inference.

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The certificate stated that death was fue to pneumona, that Goodfellow had been ill two weeks. It was signed by Dr. Carveth as medical attendant.

Coroner Cotton stated that the certificate threw out the inference that Dr. Carveth had been in attendance during the two weeks of illness, whereas he was only in attendance for two days; that he signed the certificate knowing eight days previous to death, and, being the last doctor in attendance, it was his duty to notify the coroner.
