

TOKIO, Oct. 1—A 30-hour rain with resultant floods has taken a heavy toll of life and property damage in Central Japan. Twenty are known to be dead in Yokohoma, six in Yokusaka and three in Tokio.

## Liquor-Logged

GLASGOW, Oct. 1-St. Pierre and Miquelon, the little French islands off the Newfoundland coast, are whiskey-logged, according to reports here. Four hundred thousand gallons of liquor, chiefly Scotch whiskey, are said to have been landed there by rum-runners, who could not dodge the coastguard and put it ashore in the United States. The liquor is valued at \$3,750,000.

The Imperial Press conference have gotten well down to the task of dealing with the resolutions for the consideration of the delegates at today's session. One demanded more and cheaper telegraphic facilities for the newspapers and requested the Imperial British cable system to lay another Africa, and New Zealand, with the assistance of the Australians, put through a resolution urging the British postmaster general to hasten the completion of beam wireless stations and requesting that each one of the Dominions have the same rights as the Marconi Wireless Company in constitucting and operating their own stations in Geeat Britain. Canada was mentioned in this connection, as a favored party, and Lord Burnham, the president of the conference, pointed out that it was a private company which was operating the station. He believed that the Imperial government retained the power of dealing with all the communications which were carried.
