

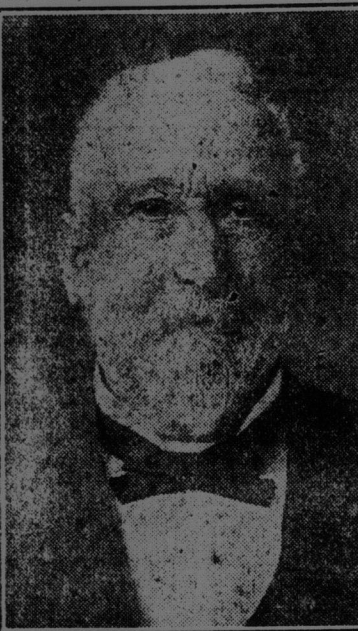
HAS BEEN 24 YEARS CHAIRMAN

Hon. J. G. Forbes Presides
Again at Victorian Order
Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting of the Victorian Order of Nurses is being held this afternoon in the Bible Rooms, German street. Hon. J. G. Forbes, who has been president for the last 24 years, ever since the organization here, was in the chair and presented the report of the directors. He congratulated the organization on the fact that it was entering upon its twenty-fifth year of activity under such favorable circumstances.

During the year, the report stated, they employed eight nurses, who devote a portion of each day to child welfare work and cheerfully have made 16,000 visits to these homes, including 4,423 child welfare visits, and held 146 well baby clinics, through which more than 2,000 babies passed. These are held under the supervision of Doctors Rowley, Kenney (West

Side), Murray (East St. John) and Lunney. These gentlemen and Dr. Murray give their services without fee or reward. The advice these doctors give the mothers as to the care of their children and the need of medical attention by the family physicians is of the greatest value.

"It is gratifying to know," says the report, "that this nursing and training has so impressed the councillors of Lancaster (for several years) and Simonds that they came to our assistance and each contributed \$500 to our support. These gentlemen realize it is the personal visit from house to house that tells. These ladies, some brought up in luxury and ease, have at all times gone out to face the weather, bag in hand to carry out the work to which they have consecrated the best part of their lives.

Finances. The financial aspect was reported most encouraging. A grant of \$3,000 from the city, \$2,800 from the Board of Health and \$500 each from the



Parishes of Lancaster and Simonds, and a liberal grant from the I. O. D. E. Chapter would enable the order to continue with eight nurses and provide the cheer and comfort being given the poor of the city. The need was growing and it was regretted that they could not employ 10 nurses.

The nursing staff was reported of a very superior class, with Miss Coates an efficient chief superintendent. "Today," says Hon. Mr. Forbes in his report, "there are on the board three members appointed in November, 1920, viz., Mrs. McEldan, Mrs. George P. Smith, and your humble servant. We have struggled under many difficulties and we show a good promise for the future. We cannot close this report without expressing our regret at parting from Miss Walsh of the West Side, an able, conscientious nurse, who was transferred to Winnipeg at her own request. I desire to ask you to kindly relieve me of further service. For 24 years you have honored me by being chairman on your board. I decline re-election."

The report of Miss Coates, chief superintendent of nurses, on the work to December 31, 1923, shows: Number of cases, 1,088; medical cases, 262; surgical cases, 111; prenatal cases, 195; maternity cases, 423; chronic cases, 10; communicable diseases, 82; confinements attended, 417; operations performed, 50; child welfare visits, 4,423; clinics held, 146; kindergarten inspections, 61; home school visits, 30; free visits, 1,661; bedside nursing visits, 12,234; total free visits, 6,192; grand total visits, 16,657.

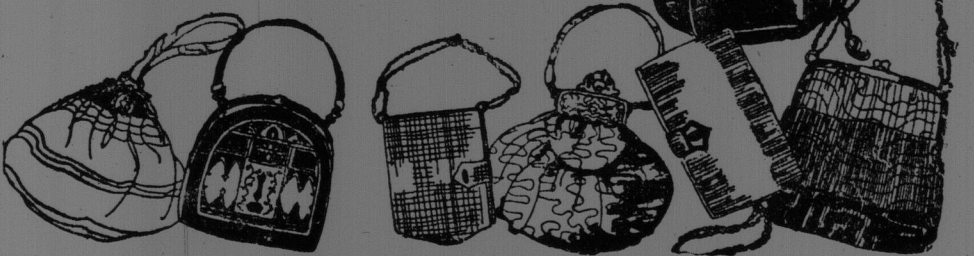
