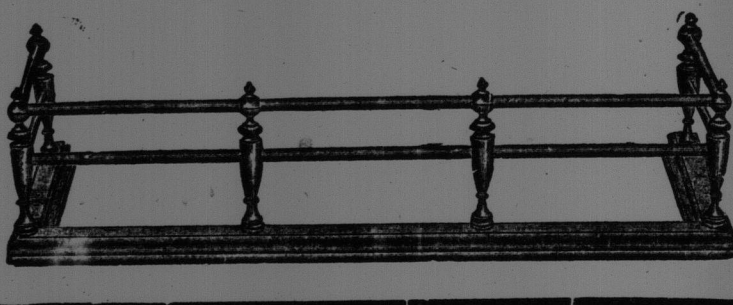

LOCAL NEWS

A JANUARY BUTTERFLY.
Little Lesta Chetley, 26 Bryden street, came to the Times office today with a living butterfly, caught in the dining room of her home on Wednesday. It was flying about the room as if in summer.

THE LATE MRS. W. J. NELSON
Besides those mentioned yesterday, Mrs. W. J. Nelson, whose death occurred in the hospital on Wednesday, is survived by a brother, George. The funeral will be held on Saturday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock from her late residence, 274 Princess street.

TRAFFIC CASES.
Two by-law cases in which James H. Williams, chauffeur for Thomas Parks, was reported for having no front or rear light on January 1, were heard in court, charged with exceeding the speed limit, were taken up in the police court this morning. Both pleaded guilty and were fined \$10 each.

THE FUND SWEELED.
The magistrate made an appeal for the "down and out fund" at the morning session of the police court, and the sum of \$5.49 was collected to help some poor unfortunate to get to his home when stranded in the city.

NO INQUEST.
Coroner H. A. Porter said this morning with reference to the death of Marguerite McNeil, who died in the General Public hospital after being struck by a street car in Brussels street, that as there was nothing to show that death was caused by anything but accident, an inquest would be unnecessary.

IN MEMORY OF HERO SON.
Mrs. E. J. McCarron of Hampton, recently received a silver cross from the department of militia, Ottawa, in memory of her son, E. J. McCarron, Jr., who was killed in action during the world war. He enlisted with the sportsman's battalion, Winnipeg, and was in St. John, while they were at the front. His brother, Matthew McCarron is chief train dispatcher for the C.N.R., Moncton, and a cousin, Patrick McCarron, was the first New Brunswicker who was killed in the South African war.

DOMINION TAXES.
Ratepayers are getting anxious in regard to forms for returns for 1920. On enquiry at the office of the Inspector of taxation he stated that as soon as the forms are received they will be sent immediately to postmasters all over the province. Returns of salaries of employees, dividends to stockholders and payments to beneficiaries of estates must be filed not later than March 31st. Individual and corporation income returns must be filed not later than April 30th.
