FATAL CAR ACCIDENT.

Gripman Tries to Pass In Front of a Railway Train.

Oakland, Cal., Dec. 5.-W. N. Joseph, gripman, and J. H. Wilson, conductor of the cable car which collided with the local train last night, resulting in the death of Miss May Coats and injuring William H. Waste, a young lawyer, who were passengers, were arrested and charged with manslaughter, but were released later on their own recognizances. An examination of the cables showed that the accident was not caused by a broken strand, as reported last evening. All things go to indicate that it was the fault of Carmen Joseph and Wilson. They apparently attempted to cross ahead of the train so as not to be delayed.
