SUDDEN DEATH - On Wednesday afternoon about 2 o'clock, Mr. John McKenna who was on a visit here, to his mother-in-law, Mrs. McKenna, suddenly fell dead in a field adjoining the lower district school house.

Dr. J. S. Benson was summoned to hold an inquest, but as deceased had been under her care for consumption, he judged it unnecessary, as such a result was to be looked for under such circumstances.

The cause of death was the bursting of a blood vessel in the lungs. The deceased was about 40 years of age and leaves a wife in New York.

Celebration. The election of Mr. Snowball was celebrated yesterday by the streets being decorated with flags and the burning of bonfires in the evening.

Accidents. FIREMEN TAKEN OFF - One day in the early part of last week a man named Barry had the top of his fingers taken off by between two deals at the mill of Guy Bryan & Co., at Black Brook.

JAW BROKEN - On Saturday night at 9.30 as Mrs. Dullahy wife of Patrick Dullahy, living in Queen Street while crossing Water Street, was run over by a horse driven by two boys, and carried insensible to her house. She was attended by Dr. J. S. Benson, and it was found that her lower jaw was broken at its angle on the right side, but she is now doing well.

DROWNED - On Tuesday morning last, Coroner J. S. Benson held an inquest on the body of a young man named Thomas Bradley, seaman of the barquentine Chatham. The evidence showed that between 10 and 11 on Monday night the watchman of the harbor St. Helena which lay alongside the Globe, heard a splash as of a man falling into the water, the vessels being commanded at Mairhead's mill wharf. As he once gave the alarm, and both crews turned out to search, but saw nothing. On inquiry it was found that Bradley was the only missing man from either crew, and it was known that he had gone ashore between 9 and 10 that evening. After breakfast on Tuesday morning, three of the crew of the Globe commenced grappling opposite the wharf and after working half an hour found the body. A verdict was returned of "found drowned."

Respectability. If the Advance wants Mr. Mitchell to be respectable, let him keep abusing Mr. R. P. Whitney, Robert R. Col and M. Adams. They at least are respectable.

The Advocate, which forced a clergyman's name last week to a document intended to whitewash its "junior form" character ought not to say too much about "respectability." But, being puffed up with his imaginary importance, he rejected the advice, and allowed the Manager to run his paper. The consequence has been that Snowball's more judicious friends foresaw the canvass of slander and defamation which has disgraced journalism, has also disgraced the great body of its readers, and has brought to Mr. Mitchell's support a great many voters who before were lukewarm and uninterested."

The above was aimed at the Advance. In the light of Tuesday's experience, such silly vapourings ought to be discontinued. The readers of the Advocate were named with them for four years.

"Mr. Adams." The Advance is now abusing Mr. Adams. He has liberty to write against him. He fears him not. The Electors' opinion of Mr. Adams was expressed on Tuesday last. At Lower Altwick, where Hon. Surveyor-General Adams was assisted by Hon. Robert Young, President of the Executive Council of New Brunswick, in the work of defeating Snowball, they came out in a minority just sixty-nine votes, and in that whole Parish, where the President of the Council and Mr. Adams boasted of their great influence they were defeated by one hundred and fifty-eight out of a total vote of three hundred and seventy-three.
