FREDERICTON, N. B., July 16.—The local government met in session this evening, the full occasion being devoted to the consideration of the report of the Auditor General, Mr. J. H. McMillan, on the accounts of the late Crown Lands Deputy, Mr. J. H. Flewelling.

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MAINE SWEEP ON ALL SIDES BY BIG FIRES

Houses and Barns Destroyed

FIRES BURN FIERCELY One Descends Upon Village of Wells, Burning Everything in its Route

PORTLAND, Me., July 15.—Temporarily smothered by a shower of two days ago almost all the forest fires, which have been devastating the Maine timber lands for the past two weeks, broke out afresh today, and with severity added tonight the state from corner to corner is literally fire swept. The most dangerous fire in the state is near Wells village in York county. The flames are now but a mile from the town and gaining every minute despite the efforts of 500 men gathered by special trains from all cities within a radius of 75 miles. Three farm houses on the outskirts are already burned. There are three big fires in the very suburbs of Portland; the plant of the Home Dairies Company in East Deering near here is gone with a loss of \$25,000.

A lumber mill and 400,000 feet of lumber is burned at Cape Porpoise in York county.

In the northern end portion of the state a terrible fire is raging at Bigelow and is destroying hundreds of thousands of feet of standing timber on the lands of the Great Northern Paper Company.

Hundreds of deer and smaller game have perished in the flames which have swept the woods.

Toward Timber Land

WELLS, Me., July 15.—After burning two small dwelling houses, a barn, some other buildings and a large quantity of manufactured lumber, the forest fire which has been burning for two days between the western division of the Maine and Maine railroad and the Maine turnpike in Wells, took a change of direction this evening and swept toward a large area of timber land in the direction of North Berwick. No houses or other buildings are in the path of the flames, as they are now headed, but a strip of woods five miles in length, seems likely to be destroyed.

The total damage of the fire today is estimated at \$25,000, the larger part of which falls on Chesley and McDaniell of Harrington, N. H., who had 100,000 feet of manufactured lumber destroyed. The two houses burned today were located on a side street close to the Second Congregational church and not far from the turnpike.

DOUGHS FIERCELY RESIST ARREST

Whole Band Fights Officers

FINALLY TAKEN Six Men and Six Women Arrested—Band Probably Doomed

YORKTON, Sask., July 16.—Acting under instructions from the provincial government to have the Doukhobor ring-leaders at Aradella Camp committed to jail, Inspector Junget decided to make the raid last night, when ten constables of R. N. W. M. P. under Sergeant Vickery, armed with warrants to arrest six men and women, proceeded to carry out the orders at midnight.

The Doukhobors fiercely resisted arrest and the whole band of sixty in number turned out to the assistance of twelve. A pitched battle was fought between the police and Doukhobors, during which the latter made free use of sticks of cordwood and whatever weapons were handy. After three hours' fierce struggling the police effected the arrests and overpowered the balance and leaving a guard at camp, returned to Yorkton at 5 a. m. with twelve prisoners. These were at once brought before Inspector Junget and each sentenced to six months' imprisonment.

Six women immediately after receiving sentence were quietly dispatched in wagons to Canora on their way to Prince Albert jail. Six men were left at camp to be taken to the early tomorrow morning to be distributed throughout the different jails in the province. This is part of an experiment to see what the effect will be on those left behind, and is thought to be the beginning of the breaking up of the whole band.
