## Ernie Sterling Takes Measure of American Runners in Two Races

Speedy St. John Boy Victor in One-Mile and Three-Mile Events.

May be Forerunner of Victory in Big Fifteen-Mile Race Today.

Amherst, July 15.—The old home week celebration is drawing to a close and the universal opinion is that it was an unequalled success. In the masked carnival on Thursday night the climax of celebration was reached. Between 12 and 1 o'clock, over 500 masqueraders lined up for the procession and headed by a unique organization called the pilgrims band, and accompanied by a burlesque brigade of soldiers marched through the streets.

Fully 10,000 people lined the thoroughfares and the blaze of electric lights made the scene look like a glimpse of fairyland. The procession ended at Aberdeen rink which had been transformed into one large dance hall. Dancing was kept up until the early morning hours. The costumes for the carnival were imported from New York and were of the most magnificent character. This morning was devoted to sightseeing and in the afternoon field sports were the main attractions.

The one mile race witnessed a warm contest between E. Sterling, of St. John; John Robertson, of Brookline, Mass.; Horne, of Dorchester, Mass., and D. McManan, Springfield, Sterling was closely pressed throughout, running in 4 mins. 50 secs. The 440 yard dash was a great race between Paul, of Charlotetown, and Blanche, of the Ramblers. Blanche winning in 57 secs. Dr. Garfield McDonald took first place in the shot putting and running high jump and John McDonald, of Pictou, second. The hop, step and jump resulted the same way so that altogether it was a great day for the McDonald clan.

### Three Mile Best.

The three mile race was the race of the day. There were seven starters, Sterling, St. John; A. Horne, Dorchester, Mass.; John Cook, and John Robertson, Brookline, Mass.; R. L. Styles, Ramblers, and Courtney Casey, Amherst. It was a great race from the word "go." Sterling, Horne and Cook fighting for the lead and frequently passing and repassing each

other. In the last two laps Sterling drew away from his opponents but it was not until he breasted the tape that he looked like a sure winner. It was one of the best races ever witnessed on the Amherst track.

Yesterday was a great day for the ponies at old Moosepath, and with the large field of the ponies in some of the races there was any quantity of good sport. There were some disappointments for the wise ones who wagered their coin on their favorites but as a rule the public had a little the better of the argument, and there was general satisfaction. The favorites showed up well, but several surprises were sprung and the interest was at all times keen.

All the races were good, but the second was a hair raising contest between Judge Dundon, Tangle and Doctor Young. They finished in the order named, but the three could have been covered with a blanket as they came under the wire.

There was a fairly large attendance and the outlook is that today will see one of the largest crowds ever in the park. That the running games has caught on here there is no doubt and already the fans are counting the days until the big exhibition meeting. The summary is as follows:

On a track to his liking, Pleasing had little difficulty in beating off his company in the fifth race. Lista did not show the dash she generally displays and finished outside the money. In this race Sabo Blend had a large following for the place, and finished there.

L. Hunter's good mare Anna Smith broke down in the running of the fifth race, and will hardly go to the barrier again. She has been a most useful performer for Mr. Hunter and has rarely been out of the money since the beginning of the racing season.

Getaway day at Moosepath Park will be the most interesting of the entire meeting. With the Dufferin Hotel Furze and the Fleming Consolation as the features of a well rounded card, the sport will eclipse any yet seen here. All the events are particularly well filled, and sterling contests will undoubtedly be in order. St. Mary's band will discourse sweet music during the afternoon and altogether it should be a banner day at the local course. The first race will start at 2.45 sharp and will all be run off by 5.30 o'clock.

The first of the seven races carded is at the mile distance, and looks a place where Flarney should win. A high class horse, and one of the best bred in the country is Sanguine, who will be presented to the national breeding bureau after the racing season is over. We do not expect him to beat Flarney, however. Many Colors ap-

pears to be the principal contender, and Square Deal should look after the others.

Jubilee Juggins will have a track to his liking today and we expect to see him in front at the end of the second race. Pleasing and Tangle will offer the most opposition, with Billie Hibbs taking advantage of any mishaps should those mentioned make any mistakes.

Of the eight that will start in the third race, Johnny Wise must be given the preference, though he has not yet shown to his best advantage on the local track. Of the others Irwin P. Digs may be expected to run a better race than his last out. Jack Blinn should be able to stall off the rest.

The Fleming Consolation, the fourth on the card, looks a place where Lady Chilton could score. She has not started here, but one of her good races would make her the victor. Bonnie Bee and Marie Rue seem to have a little on the rest of the field.

If Jack Ryan can come back with anything like the form he displayed yesterday, he will have no difficulty in scoring today. Yankee Lady and Maurice Reed are fast ones and will take some beating, however, while Fleece and Tender will have to be reckoned with.

Miss Cesarion showed that she was back to her best condition Thursday and we expect her to lead the field in the sixth race. Etta May and Sabo Blend appear to be the contenders. Giovanni Reggio and Laura A. also here, and must be counted with. The field is a large one and a surprise may happen, but we pin our faith to the three first mentioned.

### St. John Boat Club's New

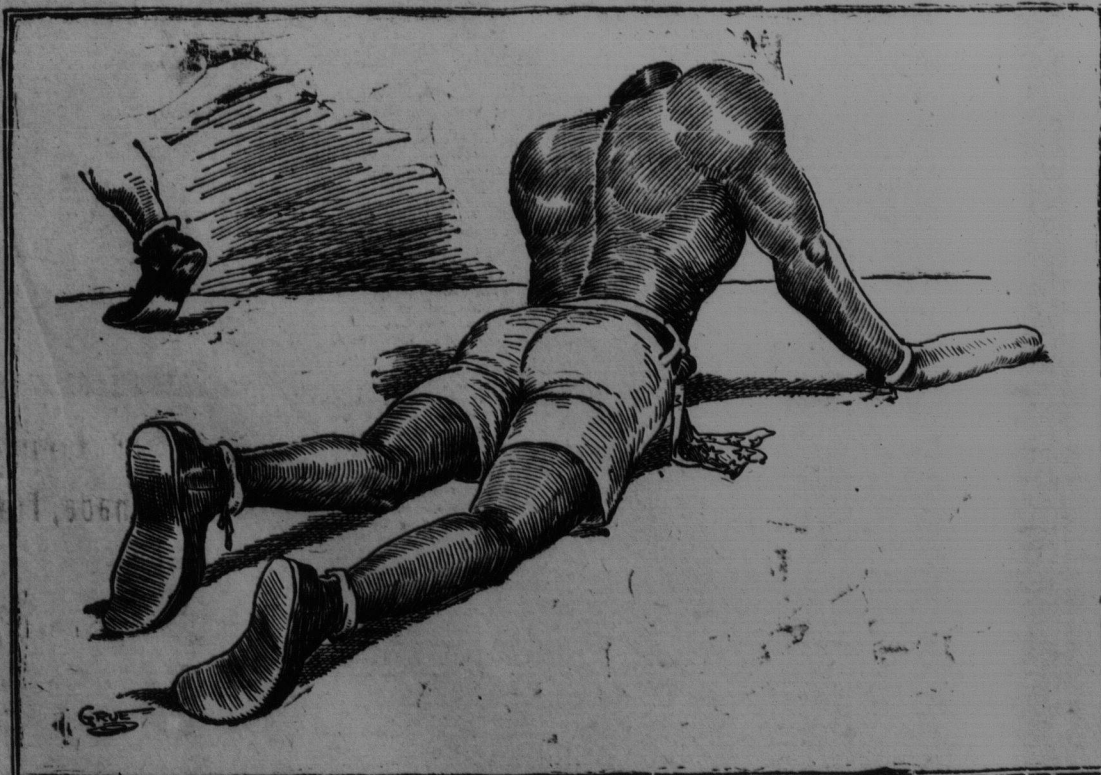
Quarters Soon Ready for Opening --- Montreal Man Donates Cup.
