RUSSIANS PUT WHOLE ENERGY INTO EFFORT TO DRIVE WEDGE BETWEEN THE TEUTON ARMIES

Attache Dismissed from U.S. Complains British Authorities Opened His Private Papers at Falmouth.

London, Jan. 5, 4.25 p. m.—Captain Franz Von Papen, the recalled Ger-man attache at Washington, telegraph ed today from Falmouth, where he ar-rived on the Noordam, to the Ameri-can embassy here, asking it to com-

private papers at Falmouth.
Captain Von Papen, in his message claimed that personal letters and bank books of his were opened, and that some of these were retained by the authorities.

The British authorities, who seized Captain Von Papen's correspondence at Falmouth, are not worried by possible protests, as his safe conduct embraded only the person of the German military attache.

Captain Von Papen has sailed for Rotterdam on board the Noordam leaving some of his papers in the hands of the authorities, who will decide later on their final disposition.

It is explained here that if a safe conduct were allowed to cover the personal papers and effects of a bearer, belligerents might maintain an excellent messenger service by using expelled officials for that purpose.

London, Jan. 5.—While the battle on the borders of Bessarabia is apparently still far from decision, each day finds the Russians claiming the occupation of additional enemy positions, and Petrograd believes that if this process continues a short time longer, a break somewhere

The whole energy of the Russian army is being directed to making a gap between the German armies in the centre, and the southern Austrian forces, and the desparte Austrian attacks in the region of Kolki are designed to prevent this.
