

BI-LINGUALISTS WILL NOT SEND PUPILS TO THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Have Programme Ready in Event of an Adverse Decision by the Privy Council.

Ottawa, Oct. 16.—Preparations are being made by the bilingualists for an adverse decision by the Privy Council. Should the judgment refuse the bilingual rights for which they have been fighting so long, and insistently they will transfer their allegiance from the separate to the public schools.

They will transfer their taxes on the public schools. In addition they will support their own parochial schools, and will not send their pupils to the public schools. This is in effect the propaganda which has been passed and which will be set in operation if an adverse decision is rendered.

Michigan Man and Wife Make an 800-Mile Trip East.

RESCUED CREW ARRIVE IN BOSTON

Men from the Peter C. Schultze who Abandoned Vessel in Storm Return Home on Governor Cobb.

Boston, Oct. 16.—The seven members of the crew of the schooner Peter C. Schultze, which was abandoned at sea in a sinking condition a week ago, arrived here today on the steamer Governor Cobb from Yarmouth, N. S. The sailors were picked up by their vessel when she was on the point of foundering by the Gloucester fishing schooner Patriot. Captain H. H. Lawson was injured from jumping from the wreck to the rescuing boat.

The Schultze left Elizabethport, N. J., September 27, for Halifax laden with coal. On October 9, in a north-easterly gale the sails were torn to pieces and the mountainous seas that raked the decks smashed the boats and left the men without means of escape. They had been clinging to the decks for eleven hours when rescued.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homestead may be made within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 10 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homestead in good standing may be made in a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$30 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning a modest patent; also 30 acres extra cultivation. (Preemption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.)

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$25 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years, cultivation 30 acres and erect a house worth \$500.

The case of cultivation is similar to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. 1400 stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

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WOULD ELIMINATE "OBEY" AND "ENDOW" FROM THE MARRIAGE CEREMONY

Committee of Episcopal Church Recommends Using "Amen" only at End of Direct Prayer of Fraise.

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 16.—Revision of the church hymnal, entailing the elimination of all hymns, save those of direct prayer or praise, was recommended to the annual convention of the Protestant Episcopal church today in the report of the commission of hymnal. The revised book would contain 559 hymns, instead of 679, as does the book now in use.

It also is recommended that in hymns the word "Jesus" be substituted for the old form "Jesu."

The report of the commission on prayer book was presented by Rev. Edward L. Parson, of Berkeley, Calif.

A minority report on the prayer book was read, recommending that the words "obey" and "endow" be eliminated from the marriage ceremony.
