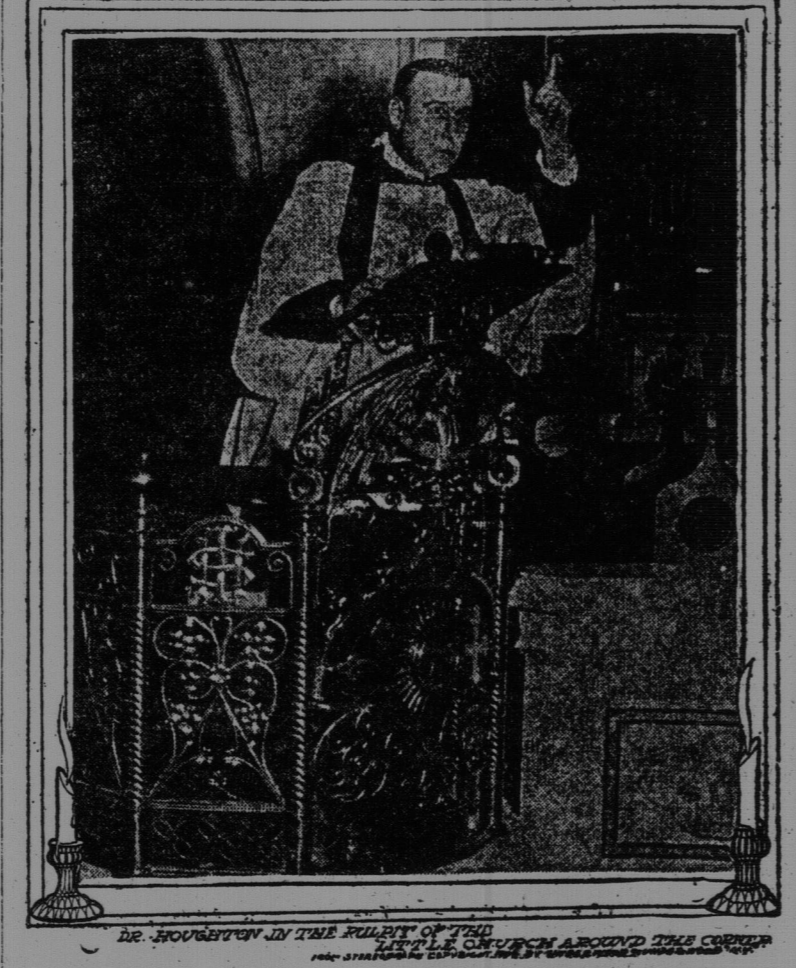

New York, Oct. 31.—Eloping lovers and others who seek hasty or secret marriages will no longer find a Gretna Green in the Little Church Around the Corner, famous throughout the country for the romantic unions that have been effected there.

This is the decision of the Rev. Dr. George C. Houghton, rector of the church. He has declared that hereafter the sanctuary over which he presides will not be the place for the performance of ill advised marriages nor of any kind that cannot be considered regular in the fullest sense of the term.
