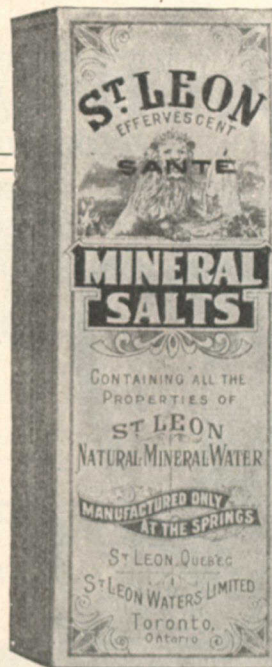

The chief choral work at the first concert will be Frederick Cliffe's setting of "Ode to the North-East Wind." The New York Symphony Orchestra created such a favourable impression in the city on its former appearance that its extensive patronage is assured.
